In the prayers and music, scripture and creeds of our liturgy, worship calls out in us our own need for reconciliation with God, others, and self, and then sends us to share that reconciling grace with others. A special part of worship in the Season of Reconciliation is the “Witness to Reconciliation”, as people in our faith community share their own stories of places of reconciliation in their life of faith. As we hear stories shared, we foster both a gratitude for the way God’s grace is at work in the people of Hope Church and a deeper awareness of our own places of division, reconciliation and witness in our lives.

## February Focus on Autism

Beginning in February, the Health Ministry will give Christian education sessions to several mental health issues, focusing for three weeks on the severe upswing in the number of children born with Autism. We will be led into awareness of this mysterious, daunting life-altering developmental spectrum by two people: Dr. David Lama, a specialist in treatment; and Kirsta Mason, founding mother of Benjamin's Hope.

In anticipation of these sessions, we share a poem by Craig Romkema, a unique young man living with autism. The poem is from his moving poetry book, "Embracing the Sky", which will be made available, along with other significant books, during the month of February.

## Children's Ministry

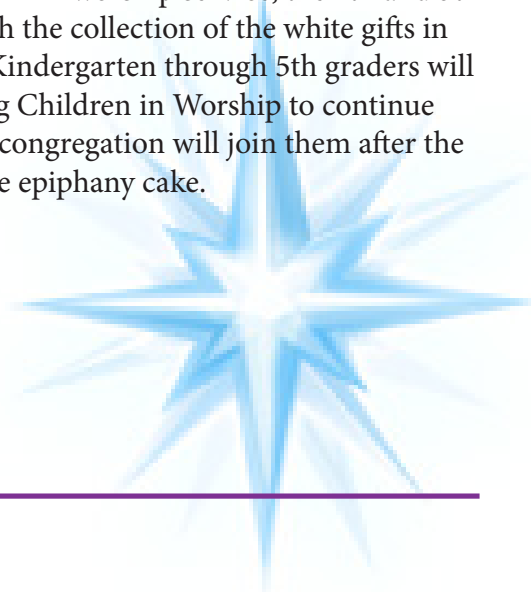
### Nursery Joy

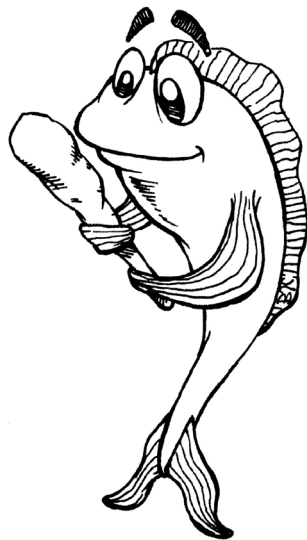


## Youth Ministry

January is National Mentoring Month! Along with others in programs across the nation, we wish to recognize the contributions of our mentors this January, but we also wish to recognize our substitute mentors without whose support, our mentors would not be able to make the impact they make in the lives of our Vanderbilt students.

Each program year, there are times when our mentors are unable to meet with their Kids Hope student. If that absence is extended (two weeks or more), substitute mentors are provided. Like the mentors they replace, each substitute has received three hours of Kids Hope training and an orientation to Vanderbilt Charter Academy. Mentors who request their services provide substitutes with a specific orientation to the needs and abilities of the student with whom they will work. Some of our substitutes work with two or three students over the course of the year; some work with just one. In either case, the services of our substitute mentors make it possible for us to maintain that continuity of presence, which is our goal for each of our Vanderbilt students throughout their Kids Hope experience.

I am NOT a big fan of mission statements. I AM a big fan of the Hope Church Statement of Mission. In saying I am not a fan of mission statements in general I don't mean to sound harsh. It's just that I don't typically pay a lot of attention to mission statements, as it seems to be easy for such statements to be made and then left behind. But I've become a fan of the Hope Church Statement of Mission because I've found the statement to be alive on an ongoing basis in the people and purpose of Hope Church. The current Statement of Mission was written in 1977 (see text below) and since that time has remained relevant and formative in the life of Hope Church. I often hear people referring to "pioneering", to "growing in faith", and to other aspects of the statement of mission as ideas and decisions are considered at Hope Church. As we move ahead from our 150th anniversary year, the Consistory is recommending a revision of the Statement of Mission. The new version incorporates much of the original, while adding content that is shaping and guiding Hope Church in new ways. On the following page is a draft of the new Statement that reflects feedback from the congregation given at the December congregational meeting. At the upcoming congregational meeting on January 20 there will be a final draft presented for approval. If you have any feedback, please contact me or Jill by Wednesday, January 9. We're grateful for the work that has been done on this, and believe this new Statement will continue to faithfully guide the witness of Hope Church in the years ahead.

## HOPE CHURCH, RCA STATEMENT OF MISSION (1977)

*"Now there are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit, and there are varieties of service but the same Lord, and there are varieties of working, but it is the same God who inspires them all in every one." I Corinthians 12:4-7*

Hope Church affirms the unity which binds together diverse people as the Church Universal. Unity is possible and diversity is celebrated because the Church is the very Body of Christ.

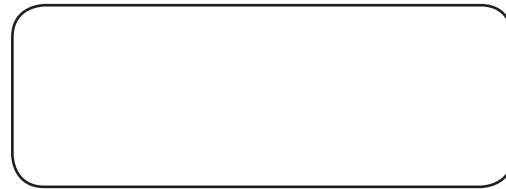
