Stay Connected with Hope Church Online





April 7 Post Resurrection Appearances of Jesus

Three presenters will lead us in a morning of scripture and reflection on Post Resurrection Appearances of Jesus through a variety of artistic works. Marlin VanderWilt will guide us in reflection through art and scripture, and Keith Derrick will guide us in reflection through poetry and scripture. The morning will conclude with a Bible Study led by Jim Brownson.

April 14 through May 19 *Christianity: the First Three Thousand Years, Part I*

Last spring we focused on the history of the Reformed Church of America and the history of Hope Church. This spring we will go back further in time to learn about the early history of Christianity.

We will watch and discuss the first half of a DVD series produced by the British Broadcasting Company and directed by Diarmaid MacCulloch, Professor of History of the Church and Fellow at St. Cross College Oxford. In the first six sessions of a series that will be continued in 2013-14, we will learn about the spread of Christianity from Jerusalem to Asia, Africa, and Europe and about the pros and cons of the relationship of the church with imperial powers. MacCulloch combines church history with travelogue—enriched by music, architecture, and visual arts—in presenting his tour of the early history of Christianity. Each of the discussion leaders is a member of the greater Consistory of Hope Church.

April 14 The First Christianity (Part I) with Judy Parr

Rooted in Judaism and influenced by Greek and Roman cultures, the first Christians helped to spread their faith far beyond the Mediterranean world.

April 21 *The First Christianity (Part II)* with Don Luidens

What if the center of early Christianity had not been Rome? Syria, Baghdad, and Constantinople were places where early Christian communities thrived. As Christianity spread, its leaders struggled to define the nature of Jesus Christ.

April 28 *Catholicism: The Unpredictable Rise of Rome (Part I)* with Don Luidens Though the first Christians were persecuted by Rome, the Roman Emperor Constantine converted to Christianity, and that faith became the official religion of the Roman Empire.

Information regarding adult education classes offered in May will be available in the May newsletter and online.

Ministry Highlight

The Community Ministry at Hope Church

This the first of a new series of highlights on ministries at Hope Church, intended to be sure our members are aware of how things happen and their opportunities to engage with the ministry of the church.

The Community Ministry informs, engages, and supports Hope Church members as we live our mission statement, specifically "to be a servant to the human community."

Our focus is to encourage Christian action and mission: to unleash the gifts that Hope Church can give to others and relationships that can be formed outside of Hope Church. We aim not only to spread the Word, but to make our world a more loving and caring place. In collaboration with the Board of Deacons and the Reconciliation Ministry, the Community Ministry manages benevolent giving on behalf of our congregation, in addition to planning events and ongoing programs.

Our community giving is typically to local ecumenical and cooperative agencies that address needs for food, housing, health care, education, and more, including, for example:

- Good Samaritan Ministries and Community Action House for housing, hunger, and other issues related to economic well-being and independence (The 10th Street House, part of the Community Housing Partnership providing transitional homes, is also under the Community Ministry umbrella.)
- The Holland Community Health Center, Free Health Clinic, and Lakeshore Parish Nurse Program for health care
- Center for Women in Transition for domestic violence prevention
- Special Education Ministries and Camp Sunshine for support of those with disabilities
- The CASA after-school tutoring program (and our own Kids Hope mentoring program) for education

The Community Ministry is Hope Church's liaison to the Neighborhood Connections program, which often provides updates through the newsletter and is just beginning its second year as a new approach to community engagement.

The Community Ministry also provides an organizational home for the Caring for Creation Task Force at Hope Church. That team informs and engages members about ways to engage with our environment and consume more responsibly to nurture and enhance God's creation.

Opportunities for participation with the Community Ministry occur throughout the year, with the high point being the Think Hope auction event in May (see article on page 5). Watch the newsletter and website for announcements of volunteer activities. The Community Ministry is also interested to hear from members about their own community-building work, which informs us, helps us set priorities among all of the many choices that must be made, and occasionally enables us to support a special event or project. Reconciliation Ministry

The Reconciliation ministry is planning to share a regular column in the Hope Church News. Coming out of the Season of Reconciliation this year, we heard people expressing to us how valuable this season has become in the life of our congregation. The themes of reconciliation, restoration, forgiveness, peacemaking, and justice fill the Scriptures from start to finish. The work of reconciliation is a lifelong commitment. We hope this column will encourage you in your day to day efforts to join with Christ in the ministry of reconciliation.

One practical tool of reconciliation we offer as a ministry within Hope Church is the Restorative Circle process. If you would ever like to call a circle to address a conflict you can contact any of the trained facilitators in our church who are listed in the side bar of this column. They would be happy to work with you to address that issue whether it is a conflict in your family, your workplace, your neighborhood or within the life of our church.

Gearing Up for Think Hope

By now we hope you've marked your calendar to attend the Think Hope event on Saturday, May 18. Like previous years, the event will include a silent auction of items that reflect the creativity and talents of our members. Past-year items have included knitted scarves, hand-sewn grocery bags, nurtured garden plants, babysitting and carpentry services, original artwork, and signed first-edition copies of members' books. The possibilities are as



unlimited as our creative energy! It's time to start crafting now; watch for announcements of logistics to deliver auction items to the church.

High Hopes



Jubilate Choir Prepares Musical, 100% Chance of Rain





Two Hope Church members were recently recognized for their outstanding work in the community. Their passion and committed leadership are inspiring and we are thrilled to see their years of service and leadership recognized.



Dr. Jane Dickie, a professor emerita of psychology at Hope College, was one of 18 women from West Michigan honored as "Michigan Makers – Women Who Inspire". Jane was a member of the Hope College faculty from 1972 until retiring in 2012. She established and served as the first director of the college's women's studies program. Her involvement in the community includes serving as vice president of the Board of the Center for Women in Transition, as vice president of the consistory of Hope Church and as a member of the Board of Room for All.



Peter Boogaart received the Outstanding Earth Steward Award from Michigan Interfaith Power and Light for his passion for the earth and dedication to combating environmental issues. Peter has been the coordinator for the Caring for Creation task force at Hope Church for ten years. Peter also serves as chairperson for West Michigan Creation Care, a past board member of West Michigan Environmental Action Council, and an advocate for the city of Holland's Community Energy Plan.

Deacons' Fund

As you opened your box of yearly giving envelopes this month you probably noticed a special envelope for April designated for the Deacons' Fund. These envelopes are inserted in the box 6 times a year to encourage member contributions to the Deacons' Fund. The Deacons' Fund is maintained to provide temporary monetary assistance to Hope Church members and/or others from whom requests for emergency assistance are received. Confidentiality and accountability are maintained in this fund and the Deacons receive a periodic report of dispersed funds without listing the names of the persons receiving assistance. Any funds donated to the Deacons' Fund will be credited to the donor's contribution record. and finally...

I've become aware recently of just how American I am. I proclaim that I am first and foremost a child of God (and in fact that IS who I am at the core). I like to think that I am shaped by the Spirit of God in me more than I am shaped by the American culture that swirls around me. But I had a moment of self-revelation recently that caught me up short. See if you can relate. Someone challenges you about something you believe or something you have done. What is your first reaction? I can tell you some of mine: "How dare you? What right do you have to question me in this way? Who made you God? This is none of your business!" This might not be what I say out loud. But those are some of the things I want to say! Each one of these quotes comes straight out of the American play book where the assumption is that we are all individuals. The assumption is that unless the thing in question is against the law, we do not owe an explanation to anyone for anything we think or say or believe.

And then I remember again who I really am. I am a child of God. I belong to the body of Christ and that means that what I say and believe and do matters to the other members of the body. Even if the challenge coming my way feels unfair and unjust, I am obligated to engage in the conversation. 1 Peter chapter 3 verses 8-16 speaks some soothing words to calm my stubborn, individualistic American self. Here are a few excerpts that I keep coming back to:

"Finally, all of you, have unity of spirit, sympathy, love for one another, a tender heart, and a humble mind. Do not repay evil for evil or abuse for abuse; but on the contrary, repay with a blessing....Now who will harm you if you are eager to do what is good? But even if you do suffer for doing what is right you are blessed. Do not fear what they fear, and do not be intimidated, but in your hearts sanctify Christ as Lord. Always be ready to make your defense to anyone who demands from you an accounting for the hope that is in you; yet do it with gentleness and reverence." 1 Peter 3.8-9a and 13-16a

This last line is in fact a promise I have made in my ordination vows. But it is not just for those of us who are ordained as ministers within the RCA. All of us are included in the claims of this passage. I like the language of this promise: to give an account for the hope is that is in me. I don't need to justify myself. I don't need to prove my opponent wrong. I just need to bear witness to the hope that is in me. That is what Jesus did throughout his ministry. This is what the disciples after him were called upon to do. And we stand with them in a long line of believers who have promised to do the same. I don't like being called to account any more than the next person. But I am working to live into the vision of this passage. And I hope that the next time someone challenges me, the quotes that spontaneously come to mind bear a little more resemblance to 1 Peter chapter 3.
