Remember the chorus many us sang in Sunday School? The Holland Area Pride Festival helped people imagine a new ending to the familiar song, "Gay and lesbian, trans and bi. All are precious in God's sight. Jesus loves all the children of the world."

On Saturday, June 29, Centennial Park was filled with all God's children for the first outdoor Holland Area Pride

Festival. The event celebrated Pride month in support of the lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender and questioning community in the Holland Area.

The Outreach and Hospitality Ministry and Reconciliation Ministry combined efforts to have a Hope Church and Room for All presence at the Festival by sponsoring a table during the afternoon of the event. Throughout the day, the table was attended by more than a dozen Hope Church volunteers who helped to spread the news that all, regardless of sexual orientation or

gender identity, are precious in God's sight and welcome to attend and become members of Hope Church.

Fellow volunteer, Earl Laman, reported that there were "a variety of conversational experiences. People from three RCA churches expressed almost grimacing wishes their churches were 'open.' There were good, curious questions about Hope Church and its stance." Earl added, "Real sharing of life stories took place. Two late middle-agers confided to me: "The younger ones don't know what we went through.' A lot of lives were brightened, assured, uplifted, touched."

"We were so proud to have our congregation at the event," said volunteers, Fred and Lori VanDoornik, "and certainly

would love to see us do it again."

An immediate result of Hope Church's presence at the Pride Festival was evident the very next day. Someone who had learned of Hope Church's room for all at the festival attended worship for the first time that Sunday. Several Hope Church members engaged with her rough.'

Several Hope Church members engaged with her in conversation, passed the peace of Christ to her, and invited her to stay for Pizza Sunday. As Audrianne Hill said about her experience volunteering at the event, "Sometimes it is in the little steps we take that lead to big leaps forward."

Capital Campaign Update

Capital Campaign Exploratory Team and Feasibility Team

"So what's going on with those facility renovations ideas? It seems like we haven't heard much about that in a while!" That's an inquiry and commentary that has been heard a few times around Hope Church this summer. In order to make sure our process is well thought out and comprehensive, it's taking some time for the discussion and decision process to unfold, but rest assured, work on renovation ideas is indeed continuing. There are several developments to share with you, so here is the update you've been looking for!

As of this summer, here is where things stand:

- This past Spring, the Capital Campaign Exploratory Team* completed its work with architects from Elevate Studios, developing an overall concept for renovation of the Hope Church facilities. The Exploratory Team presented this facilities renovation plan to consistory for their review and input.
- Consistory responded very positively to the renovation concept from the Exploratory Team and decided to commission a Feasibility Team** as a next step. This team is taking the design concept and estimated cost of the project and exploring a workable financial plan to support the project. The Feasibility Team will report the results of their study to the consistory by the end of the calendar year for

- the consistory to assess.
- The consistory will consider the feasibility information and our current financial status and will make a decision about whether to proceed with a proposal to the congregation. A facilities renovation proposal would come to the congregation early in the new year, and would include the concept and design for the project as well as the financial costs involved.

This was a process that started with a great deal of input from you, the Hope Church congregation, and we thank you for your patience as a plan takes shape. Many thanks also to all those who have been involved in developing and assessing the renovation possibilities over the past months.

That's the update for now – watch for a complete report early in the new year!

This series of highlights on ministries at Hope Church is intended to be sure our members are aware of how things happen and their opportunities to engage with the ministry of the church.

The Christian Education Ministry at Hope Church

The Christian Education Ministry is involved with the planning, developing, and execution of a large variety of opportunities for Hope Church members to engage in faith development. The Ministry seeks to celebrate Hope's diversity, to become even more faithful to the vision of Jesus, and to assist Hope Church in becoming a mission center in our community and world. A year's activities include a variety of educational offerings for all ages, from the child in the nursery to the retiree; all of which aim to foster a commitment to the denominational curriculum which continues to present the church family with new opportunities.

Children and Youth activities can include: Children in Worship, Sunday morning church school classes, parents and children gathering for a time to play together during the week (PACT), youth hiking adventures and mission trips. Recently, the Christian Education Ministry saw a need to address the many issues our teens face on a daily basis: split-second images, fast-food dinners, instant messages, and intense competition. Thus began the 6th and 7th grade church school class, a new offering that meets twice a month during the program year. The group

meets in the library to discuss the curriculum, "Dwell," developed by Faith Alive, which asks the questions: What if church were different? Not more of the same, but less? What if our teens had the opportunity to press pause on their fast paced life so they could "be still, and know, that I am God"? Dwell is a place where we pause to imagine, wonder, marvel, and dive into God's story.

The Adult Education task force meets independently under the umbrella of the Christian Education Ministry. Adult Education activities can include: Sunday morning small groups, presentations and discussions focusing on current world topics relating to the church and her mission, as well as opportunities for members to carry out their faith commitment related to world need.

The discussion continues and ideas are still forth-coming; clearly this landmark is significant to the community.
- We have also been partnering with the renovation of a house on 15th Street called "Nuestra Casa: The Gathering Place" (Spanish for "Our House"). This

- space will be for neighbors to gather as they wish. We continue to welcome volunteers through the end of Summer and into Fall--anywhere from construction to bringing treats for volunteers. Church School

Restorative Circles at Work Among Youth

It has been more than a year now that I have been a part of the Restorative Circles group. I went through training a year and a half ago to be a facilitator. Pastor Jill and I had hoped and believed that this would be a process that we could use in our work with the youth of Hope Church.

That opportunity came up last January in our annual Fish Club retreat at Cran Hill Ranch. For those of you who haven't experienced this amazing weekend, I will give you a quick overview of what we do. We usually leave Hope Church on a Friday evening (often a snowy evening) and make the hour and a half trip to Cran Hill Ranch located just outside Big Rapids, Michigan. We stay in the Stone House, which has three large bunk rooms, a fully equipped kitchen, and living area. When we arrive, we unpack our vehicles and get settled in. After some getto-know-you games and snacks, we end the evening with devotions around a theme; this past year the theme was "Reconciliation". Bed time is 11:00 p.m.

Saturday morning we rise by 8:00 a.m. We all have times and tasks assigned for helping with cooking and clean-up of meals. After breakfast we gather for devotions, then head out for horseback riding (unless it's below zero degrees!). In the afternoon we usually go snow tubing down an amazing hill (unless there is no snow, then we head to the game room for tournaments), then we return to the Stone House for hot chocolate and devotions. After dinner we take a hayride, with lots of storytelling and singing. The hayride is usually followed by snacks and a movie, and lights out by 12:00 a.m. In the morning we enjoy breakfast, clean up and pack up, then gather for a worship service. We arrive back at church by 12:00 p.m.

As you can see, this is a wonderful, intense, fun-filled time for our youth and sponsors. We usually have between seven and 18 youth, along with three or four sponsors attending. But, along with all the good, it is a lot of time spent interacting with each other, and sometimes those times are challenging. Different personalities, expectations, ages, and social interactions sometimes clash.

This past January an issue came up with four of our youth. Three of them were getting along fine, with the fourth was feeling left out, sad, and lonely. I gathered with the four of them and we began an informal Restorative Circle process.

In allowing each person to be heard, and making sure they were understood, they began to understand what the others were feeling. There was no blame and I wasn't there to give solutions, just to listen and make sure everyone was heard. They were amazing! After only about 10 minutes, they all were anxious to start anew and be aware of including all. They were generous and compassionate, and funny! We checked in with each other a few times for the rest of the weekend, and they were all feeling good. Each one of these youth felt good about being able to face a problem, talk honestly with each other, and come up with new ways of interacting with each other, all on their own!

Sharing the Sounds of the Organ

This summer, with the assistance of professional development funds from Hope Church, I was able to attend two different organ conventions. In June, I traveled to Burlington, Vermont for the annual national convention of the Organ Historical Society, a group devoted to appreciating and preserving the heritage of pipe organ building in this country. Vermont and New England are where this group was originally founded in the 1950's.

Though I've been to quite a number of their conventions over the years, I really enjoyed being in the small village churches out in the middle of Vermont, where congregations have been cherishing their small pipe organs with pride dedication for generations. One of the oldest organs we saw was from 1837, still in completely original condition, including handpumped bellows for the winding – never electrified!

I attended two days of this convention, which involves riding from village to village, visiting small churches, and hearing concerts on each instrument. We always sang a hymn during each concert, which is a great way to experience an organ. It was

fun to reconnect with friends and colleagues, and I even met a German who has an American organ in his church in Berlin. I'd always wanted to meet him when living in Germany! It truly is a small world.

The following week found me in Kalamazoo for a regional convention of the American Guild of Organists. This convention draws a different crowd, more church musicians than pipe organ enthusiasts, and there were workshops on various practical topics interspersed with organ concerts. I attended with a few local organists from the Holland

chapter of the AGO, and saw many colleagues I've know throughout my years of living in various Midwestern towns. Since our region covers Michigan, Indiana, Illinois, and Ohio, people I knew from living in Chicago and attending Indiana University were also there.

The elaborate, big city churches of Kalamazoo and Battle Creek were a real contrast to the humble wooden village


churches of Vermont. I heard inspiring concerts, connected with colleagues, had thought-provoking conversations about the future of our vocation, and came home with lots of new energy to practice!

Energy to practice is good, because I have quite a few concerts coming up out of town this fall. I will be in Sacramento, California in September to play two concerts at the Bravo Bach Festival; a solo concert and a collaboration concert with a trombone quartet called, "The Guidonian Hand" (the name is a geeky musician reference to an inside joke!). We will also be playing the same program in October in Saratoga Springs, New York. This concert will include pieces arranged for organ

and trombone quartet, as well as some pieces written for brass and organ. Also in September, I will be playing a concert in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania on a well-known German instrument at St. Paul's Cathedral, as well as a rededication concert on the organ at my parents' church in Pennsylvania, which recently had some work done on it.

It will be a busy fall, but I'm looking forward to seeing some new instruments and sharing music with new audiences. Thank you, Hope Church, for your support of all my musical endeavors!

Stopping Obesity One Change at a Time

The state of Michigan is doing a poor job of managing obesity. In fact, Michigan is the fourth worst state in the nation. As a result, our attributable expenditures are high. We are eighth in the nation for spending on obesity related diseases, and the problem continues to increase. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, childhood obesity has increased from 7% in 1980 to almost 18% in 2010. The numbers are worse for adolescents.

What is obesity? It is simply an excess of body fat. It is due to a caloric imbalance which is more calories consumed than expended. Factors that affect this caloric imbalance are genetics, behavior, and environment. Some of us have better metabolism than others; some of us eat more than others; some of us don't have access to healthier foods.

Why do we spend so much money to treat it? There are many diseases associated with obesity: heart disease, type two diabetes, stroke, osteoarthritis, sleep apnea, and multiple types of cancers. These are chronic illnesses that may not be easily treated. Other areas of concern are the social and psychological issues that stem from bullying or even prejudice.

Obesity is not just a governmental problem or a public health problem, it is a community problem. It is *our* problem. Obesity is occurring in *our* families, within *our* workplaces. It affects



people we know and love. In order to stop this epidemic from continuing to gain ground, we must strive to make changes in both our diets and our lifestyle.

Change can be difficult to start. It takes momentum to decide to make a change and then to consciously continue to live with that change every day. Change takes effort because we have to reprogram our way of thinking. It is easier if you don't make too many changes at once.

This summer as we challenge ourselves with the Go and Glow fitness initiative to improve our health and well-being, consider *one* small lifestyle change you can make. Some ideas are substituting one piece of fruit a day instead of a candy bar, trying whole grain bread over white bread, or making a salad for lunch instead of a sandwich with processed lunch meat. You may decide to take a daily walk in a park, on the beach, or around your own neighborhood. The key is to get used to *one* change before you add another. Let's work together as a church family to encourage each other to meet our goals and make the lifestyle changes necessary to prevent and reduce this epidemic from continuing.

Book Review: Authors with Autism Highlight Unwritten Rules

The Unwritten Rules of Social Relationships: Decoding Social Mysteries Through the Unique Perspectives of Autism. This long title describes exactly what the book's authors, Dr. Temple Grandin, PhD and Sean Barron, want the reader to understand. Most social relationships develop rather naturally, learned from observation and experience. However, those who have been diagnosed with autism, like the authors, find these unwritten rules baffling.

The entire book alternates between the perspectives of its two authors – much of it is written in the first person. Grandin and Barron share their experiences from their early years. The persistence and patience of loving and dedicated parents, and teachers finally giving them

foundations for living. Both Grandin and Barron had parents who rejected physicians' suggestions that their child should be put into an institution. They taught persistently and also knew that social relationships needed to be learned. Because relating to others was difficult for the authors to understand, they put together their own "Ten Unwritten Rules." Among them are:

- 1. Everyone in the world makes mistakes. It doesn't have to ruin your day.
- 2. Being polite is appropriate in any situation
- 3. Not everyone who is nice to me is my friend.

This book and three others are available in the Hope Church Library by the Health Ministry section.

Consistory Update: Charges Against Hope Church Dropped

On July 3, the Hope Church Consistory received this official notice from Holland Classis:

'Rev. Miguel Cruz has withdrawn the filing of charges against the Hope Church Consistory in the Holland Classis. This action ends the judicial process toward which the Holland Classis had been proceeding. So as of today, the mediation/judicial process is concluded and discontinued.'

This is good news indeed, and we give thanks to God that this matter can now be put behind us. In the challenge and uncertainty that have been faced since the charge was filed, the faithful support and gracious witness expressed by this congregation have been a great blessing. We have felt God's grace bearing good fruit in the midst of this time, and we have been affirmed in witnessing to the good news of Jesus Christ for all as a part of our Classis, community, and denomination.

Deacons' Fund

Deacons' Fund envelopes are inserted in the box of yearly giving envelopes six times a year to encourage member contributions to the Deacons' Fund. The Deacons' Fund is maintained to provide temporary monetary assistance to Hope Church members and/or others from whom requests for emergency assistance are received. Confidentiality and accountability are maintained in this fund and the Deacons receive a periodic report of dispersed funds without listing the names of the persons receiving assistance. Any funds donated to the Deacons' Fund will be credited to the donor's contribution record. The Deacons want to encourage Hope Church members to support this fund with their gifts and also remember that this fund is available if there is an emergency assistance need. 
Labor Day Holiday Notice

You'll be receiving this just as my sabbatical time begins, and I wanted to offer a word of gratitude and blessing to you for the months ahead. As I enjoy some vacation this August and then move into sabbatical time for September through November, I am keenly aware of what a rare gift such a time is. I do not find it wise for me to broadcast loudly or broadly "I GET A SABBATICAL!", since a very understandable response to that could be: "When do I get one?!" There are few vocations that make space for sabbaticals, and few churches that set sabbatical as policy for their pastors. So while I cannot fix that sabbatical deficit for others, I can deeply appreciate and be a good steward of the time you are giving me, believing it will help me to serve Hope Church and our community well in the years ahead. I am very eager for a time of in-depth reading in the coming months, and I'm hopeful my start at learning Spanish will go well. And the time to travel with my wife and to have a change of pace in schedule with my family will be a wonderful part of this as well.

During these months I'm sure to see many of you in the neighborhood and around town, and just in case anyone was wondering about sabbatical etiquette, you don't have to avoid me! I'll be glad to see you, and expect you'll also see me unobtrusively attending worship on some Sundays (since my family attends Hope Church!).
