This series of highlights on ministries at Hope Church is intended to be sure our members are aware of how things happen and their opportunities to engage with the ministry of the church.

The Stewardship & Finance Ministry at Hope Church

The Stewardship & Finance (S&F) Ministry of Hope Church supports the congregation and the Consistory by providing oversight and guidance of the annual financial operations of the church.

Many people may think that the S&F Ministry 'keeps the books' for the church, but there is actually a church Financial Administrator (and other staff) who pays the bills, maintains the books (electronically), and ensures appropriate taxes are paid on time.

So, what does the S&F Ministry do?

 We work with all of the other ministries to establish and propose an annual budget for the church. This includes establishing the timeline for the budgeting process, coordinating the annual stewardship campaign, and shepherding the budget through the Consistory and the congregational meeting for approvals.

- We establish and maintain procedures to ensure that the church's financial activities are handled accurately, and with transparency and integrity while also serving the mission of Hope Church.
- We carry-out the budget that is approved by the congregation. And, yes, we do review a summary of the 'books' on a monthly basis to ensure that there is appropriate cash available to fund operations, and resolve questions that might arise from staff.
- We address finance-related topics that don't currently have a procedure or method for handling – special or unique situations.
- We maintain the "Hope Church Financial Policies and Procedures" manual.
- Annually, we perform an audit of the books, and also compliance

with the financial procedures to ensure everyone who deals with money in the church is following what is outlined in the manual.

The current members of the S&F Ministry include Henry Luttikuizen, Don Luidens, Peter Hintz, John Fleming (co-Chair), and Brad MacLean (co-Chair). Pastors Jill and Gordon are ex-officio members; and the church Financial Administrator, Karla Kammeraad-Bos, also participates in our meetings.

We anticipate that there will be openings on the S&F Ministry in the near future, and would encourage anyone who is interested to contact one of the current members. The time commitment is very low (1-2 hours per month) for ministry members, and it's not necessary to be an accountant, or really have any financial background; just a willingness to be a good steward of God's good gifts.

The next Ministry Highlight will feature the Reconciliation Ministry.

A Piece of My Mind about Peace of Mind

Advance care planning is not just for end of life. It's for anytime you cannot make healthcare decisions for yourself. Most of us have difficulty imaging being in a situation where we cannot make healthcare decisions for ourselves. Then again, we all know family members and friends who have lost the ability to make healthcare decisions for themselves.

Many of us have been placed in the position of making healthcare decisions for someone we love, but have worried about whether we're making the right decisions. Maybe we never discussed the possibility with our loved one who cannot speak on their own behalf. There's a remedy for this! Complete a Durable Power of Attorney for Healthcare (DPOA-HC) and designate a spokesperson who can speak on your behalf regarding healthcare decisions. Have conversations with the individual you designate about what is important to you, and consider what you would want to know if you're designated to make healthcare decisions for someone you love.

News from Rowland and Jane VanEs in Kenya

At St. Paul's University, an ecumenical school that has trained people for ministry since 1903, Rowland teaches Old Testament introduction and interpretation and business ethics, and Jane teaches psychology and sociology to bachelor of divinity students and a master's level course in caring for people with HIV/AIDS.

Dear Friends and Supporters,

We know that many of you have been praying for us and for Kenya as the news of the Westgate Mall attack in Nairobi was making the headlines in U.S. papers and on various television stations. This has been a long week for us and knowing that so many of you were praying has helped us get through it.

Our first news of the attack on Westgate came from our daughter Michelle. She and other high school students from Rosslyn Academy were having a retreat outside of Nairobi but they would be leaving early because of a robbery at Westgate Mall. This struck us as strange since the kids were nowhere near the mall. It soon became very clear, however, that this was not just an ordinary robbery. The shopping mall had been stormed by an undetermined number of terrorists. They were intent on causing as much harm as possible--throwing grenades and firing automatic weapons at shoppers.

We watched the news reports horrified—scanning the fleeing crowds for familiar faces. This was a mall we frequented and it was a

real possibility that friends could be there. We wondered about the fate of that friendly checkout clerk at the supermarket and the polite and cheerful security guards who always screened us as we entered. Throughout the day on Saturday we got in touch with friends to make sure they were okay. We heard stories of those who had been trapped, families separated from one another and most miraculously reunited.

Al-Shabab, a militant Islamist group from Somalia, claimed responsibility for the attack. By Saturday evening they had taken hostages. Over the next few days we would hear the stories of those that were confirmed dead as well as the growing number who were being reported missing. The days of uncertainty seemed to drag on and on. During those days Kenyans came together—donating blood for the injured, bringing food to the police, military, and Red Cross volunteers, comforting and counseling those who were wounded and traumatized.

As the siege of the mall ended on Tuesday evening a large fire burned lighting up the night sky. Later we learned that part of the mall had collapsed, slowing efforts to identify any unclaimed bodies--which may include the terrorists themselves. Even now we struggle to comprehend all that has happened. Some questions may never be answered. However, slowly the stories of what happened within the mall are coming out. We have learned of one our St Paul's University students who survived by hiding for nine hours in a walk-in freezer in the supermarket. Another student was shot an unbelievable ten



times but survived. Next week he will undergo surgery to remove the final bullet which is lodged in his chest.

During this week we have been grateful to be able to gather with fellow believers for prayer and mutual support. Despite embassy warnings to "shelter at home" a few of us gathered for worship on Sunday morning as usual where Rowland had the challenge of leading. On Monday Jane lead the intercessory prayers during St. Paul's morning chapel. In both cases, we were grateful for the leading of the Holy Spirit in times when we were at a loss for the right words.

We have also been grateful that an incident which could have caused division has not. There are many Somali refugees in Nairobi and we feared that they might be targeted in retribution. This has not been the case but we see an important role for the Islam and Christian-Muslim relations program at St. Paul's in continued healing. The more we learn about each other's faith the better. Most Muslims want peace just as much as we do; it is only a tiny minority of extremists that are holding the rest of us hostage. The Islamic leaders that are against violence are afraid to condemn Al-Shabab for fear of being attacked.

From the Family Diversity Project:

"Often, in American society today, religious and spiritual traditions and religious leaders are stereotyped as being unilaterally bigoted, intolerant or blind to the experiences, needs and rights of LGBT people and those they love. This exhibit challenges that stereotype by exploring the experiences of LGBT clergy and religious and spiritual leaders as they unite their personal stories and histories with their commitment to peace, justice and civil rights through their work in religious establishments of all kinds. The exhibit counters

faith-based prejudice by replacing the voices of bigotry and hatred with loving voices calling for full equality and inclusion of LGBT people."

Room for All Video Series

How does Room for All's (RfA) mission square with what the

Reformed Church in America believes? It's an honest question on the part of those who are genuinely conflicted about the church's response to LGBTQ inclusiveness. RfA is working with Parachute Productions in Grand Rapids on a unique videobased resource that seeks to respond to that question, considering inclusiveness as it relates to some

key themes in Reformed theology: belonging, baptism, sovereignty of God, scripture, Christian freedom, and mission.

The project consists of three parts: a short, modern-day parable that opens a consideration of each theme, followed by a series of conversation clips with Reformed pastors, educators and/or laypersons in which the themes are explored through the lens of LGBTQ affirmation, and ending with a series or written questions for

further thought or discussion. When complete, the videos and follow-up questions will be available on the Room for All website for use in small group settings or simply as a resource for anyone who visits our website.

Room for All is grateful for Hope Church's support of this project in allowing us to use the facility for filming, and to all the supportive friends who gave several hours to be part of one of the parable videos. Thank you, Hope Church!

Consistory Corner

The Consistory met on October 14th first as a full consistory and then broke into Elder and Deacon Board meetings. The following items of business came before the consistory.

 The consistory discussed a concern that was raised about how Hope Church engages in political issues such as the recent letter regarding immigration reform. The consistory began a conversation about issues of faith and politics, how to deepen our practices of hospitality, and how we can continue to speak to issues of justice and reconciliation despite political differences. A paper entitled, "Talking Together as Christians about Tough Social Issues" was distributed as a resource for this conversation which will continue at the November consistory meeting.

 The consistory approved the budget draft presented by

- Stewardship and Finance ministry to be distributed to the congregation at the end of October.
- The consistory approved the recommendation of the Personnel committee to provide insurance for our pastors for 2014 through the newly formed Reformed Benefits Association which is a combined effort of the RCA and CRC.

and finally...

When the young adults (post-high school through twenty-somethings) gathered for the Road Less Traveled on October 1st, Andrew Spidahl shared some of his life during our worship time. Talking about his bike trip from Asia to Europe before seminary, he blew us away with the stories of hospitality he experienced along the way.

Just a few days later I had the chance to see friends from the East coast who were in town for denominational meetings. One of them is leading her church through a book called, *Living into Community: Cultivating Practices that Sustain Us* by Christine Pohl. One of the four practices she lifts up is practicing hospitality.

When the consistory met in October the theme of hospitality came up again. This time the context was how we do or don't make space for people at Hope Church with vastly different perspectives on how our faith should influence our political action. You know what's coming: when the same theme shows up three times in ten days, I pay attention!

As we move into the month of

November, a month that ends with a national holiday set aside for the purpose of giving thanks, my mind is drawn back to something my friend shared from the book her church is reading. One of the practices she highlighted was hospitality as I mentioned but another one – the first one in fact – is embracing gratitude as a way of life. I haven't read the book but the title of that chapter has stayed with me. In fact, I suspect that embracing gratitude as a way of life leads quite organically toward a deeper practice of hospitality.

Here's the connection in my mind: paying attention. Close attention. I have found that when I pay attention to the details of life I am naturally drawn toward gratitude. When I am rushing about and flitting from thing to thing with little conscious attention to the details around me -I miss things. I miss the thoughtful gesture of a person reaching out to me. I miss the beauty of a stubborn flower that still blooms next to a tree that has burst into color. And when I miss those things, my mind tends to stay with my own pressing agenda and anxious thoughts.

Gratitude requires slowing down and paying attention. And when I slow down and pay attention; when I notice the details of life that inspire me to give thanks, I also notice other things as well. I notice the subtle tone of voice that signals a person in pain. I notice the person who holds a different perspective from mine with their arms stiffly crossed who needs some space to tell their story and voice their conviction. When I listen closely to what that person has to say, I find some gifts I might have missed if I had not opened the door. Gratitude as a way of life naturally leads to the offering of hospitality. The two go hand in hand.

I find myself thinking about this coming season of Thanksgiving with some slightly different expectations. I am taking it as an invitation to go deeper in cultivating gratitude as a way of life. I look forward to seeing where it leads me, and I invite you to join me if you wish. I'd love to hear your stories along the way.

Silent Auction Features Old Hope Church Cook Books


Do you have a yen for old things or have a friend for whom a well loved cook book would make a good gift? Here is your chance to obtain one!
