About six blocks south of Hope Church, a house has been renovated to become Nuestra Casa (or "our house"), a neighborhood center for social and educational activities, and a place where community can be built, one relationship at a time. The Nuestra Casa building is owned by our RCA partner, New Community Fourth Reformed Church. The renovation has been all-volunteer, including support from a number of Hope

Church members. Westcore Neighbors, the southern neighbor of Washington School Neighbors, will oversee the programs and operation at Nuestra Casa.

Our Thanksgiving gifts, presented to Westcore Neighbors designated for Nuestra Casa, will ensure a meaningful launch of the neighborhood center, paying operating expenses for several months as they break new ground with community engagement in a shared space.

Sundays, 9:40–10:40 a.m. in Commons I

November 2-23: Holistic/Integrative Health and Healing

Creating health is a multidimensional process, combining physical, emotional, spiritual, nutritional, environmental spheres and more. This four part class is designed to further create an atmosphere of hope, health and healing in our church community. It will draw on contributions from several members of Hope Church. The class is taught/coordinated by Jean McFadden, retired professor of Social Work. Christ's healings will frame the series.

November 2: The Healing Ministry of Jesus

Pastor Jill Russell will consider the spiritual healings of Jesus, with emphasis on the compassion of his ministry. There will be discussion of spiritual and physical healing as seen in the light of scripture, and our own experience.

November 9: Mind, Body and Spirit - Healing Energy

Jean McFadden with Monica Krimendahl and Ann Anderson will examine the mind, body spirit connection. All models of healing involve some form of belief. A mini overview of Western medical models, and alternative models will be considered. Other cultural models acknowledge the energy in body and mind. There are many forms of healing, but all deal with energy in some form.

Topics covered will be the effect of trauma on the body, yoga as a mental and physical discipline, and the impact

of prayer shawls. All will consider the convergence of mind, body and spirit.

November 16: Creative Arts as a Medium for Healing

Jean McFadden with Rachelle Oppenhuizen and Maxine DeBruyn will explore the ways in which creativity creates a balance of mind, body and spirit. The religious symbolism of the circle will be a theme, as well as the place of creativity, the arts, and beauty in our churches as part of the healing atmosphere. There will be a brief demonstration of creativity for those who care to participate.

November 23: The Environment as a Source of Health and Healing - Bringing It All Together

Peter Boogaart, Julia Brown and Donita Robards will present with Jean McFadden coordinating. We will examine environmental health, food for the spirit, and supports for caregivers. As individuals we will map sources of stress in our environments, and determine how we can add healing energy. How can we as a church community create an even more health-giving environment?

Bread for the World

In United States, 49 million

Americans -- nearly 16 million children -- try to survive hunger, and 45 million Americans live in poverty. The average family earns \$4,500 less than before the Great Recession. But ending hunger in America is possible, not an impossible dream.

Bread for the World has researched and developed the 2014 Hunger Report, which urges President Obama and Congress to lead the country in setting a goal to end hunger by 2030, and offers a four-part plan to accomplish this:

- 1. A jobs agenda
- A stronger safety net 2.
- Human capital development 3.
- Public-private partnerships to support innovative 4. community-led initiatives against hunger

On September 19 members of both parties of the House and Senate introduced the House's Feed the Future Global Food Security Act of 2014 and the Senate's Global Food Security Act of 2014 in order to authorize the Feed the Future Initiative. Feed the Future boosts agricultural development and addresses malnutrition in 20 of the world's poorest countries.

Nearly 1.2 billion people in developing countries live in extreme poverty, living on less than \$1.25 a day. Around the world, 805 million people suffer from hunger. In developing countries, 13.5 percent of the population is undernourished. Each year, 2.6 million children die as a result of hunger-related causes.

We live in the world's wealthiest nation. Yet 14.3 percent of U.S. households—a total of 49.1 million Americans, including 15.8 million children—struggle to put food on the table, and more than one in five American children are at risk of hunger.

We can end hunger in our time. Everyone, including the government, must do their part. More people around the world escaped poverty during the 2000s than any other decade in history. By making our voices heard in Congress, we help to ensure laws which are fair and compassionate towards people in need.

On Sunday, November 16, Lois Maassen and Doug Abell will be at hand to help you send letters asking our Congresspersons to support the House's Feed the Future Global Food Security Act of 2014 and the Senate's Global Food Security Act of 2014 in order to authorize the Feed the Future Initiative. Be part of Hope Church's commitment to the fight against hunger and poverty through education, prayer and worship.

Have faith. End hunger.

Sing a New Song?

What does it mean to "sing a new song unto the Lord?" (from Psalm 96). I don't think it's because God is tired of the old songs, or that we've worn down the meaningfulness of songs we know well. Rather, I think the phrase refers to the expressions from a renewed spirit, awakened with new appreciation for God's providence and care, that erupts into singing and praise. When we experience a fresh dose of God's care, or receive an insight that refreshes our faith, or feel the Spirit's nearness carrying us through challenge, we naturally want to direct praise and thanks to God. Singing a new song reminds us that we have new things to learn about God, new ways to experience God's care and movement. New songs, and the opportunity to learn them, tap into the fun of trying something new. It's almost like trying a new recipe that turns out to be your favorite meal.

But new hymnals? you ask. New hymnals are ways to expand our language and scope of expression. These particular hymnals include more international songs, which assists us with a sense of faith around the world. New songs tingle our imaginations and souls to see God's work in new ways, and assist us with a broader vocabulary--musically, verbally, linguistically. Using new hymnals reminds us that God is not static. We may even be awed at new ways of thinking, feeling, and responding to God and to each other in this community of faith.

The current hymnals have served us well. Yes, they're in very good shape, and will be a terrific gift to the new users. We haven't worn them out, but we are ready to embrace a new hymnal (or two) because we've seen and been inspired by the music, language, and possibilities in the new hymnals.

Why two hymnals, you ask? Consider these comparisons, if you want to review some of the work others have done: h t t p : //w w w . h y m n a r y . o r g / h y m n a l _ compare?hymnal1=GG2013&hymnal2=LUYH2013

One of the reasons we've selected these two hymnals is because they represent the Reformed tradition and they help integrate our faith with music in thoughtful ways, with careful attention to language and theology. The metaphors for God in the new hymnals expand our appreciation for the many ways God makes known God's character. Imagine (this is not a stretch!) that the only metaphor you used for God was, "Father." For many people of faith, this title is most precious and encompasses the intimacy of their faith . Others may wince with what seems to be the perpetually exclusive use of that title, and wonder about God's many other functions and manifestations, like Comforter, Fountain, Word, and Potter.

Our introduction of these new hymnals, and, we hope, the conversation about hymns, music and worship, will continue.

Youth Ministry

"Jesus said, 'Come.' So Peter got out of the boat, started walking on the water, and came toward Jesus."

What do toilet plungers, puzzle pieces, Skittles, bowling and corn mazes have to do with this gospel account of Peter walking on the water with Jesus? They were all used with our youth to talk about risk taking this past month. Our theme in both High Hopes and Fish club is risk taking and we have been exploring this idea in a variety of places. In 6th and 7th grade Sunday School we are learning that God initiates relationship with us even though we are far from perfect; the story of Abraham and Sarah in particular illustrating this for us. It is this love, which chooses us in our imperfection, that allows

us to move forward towards God in faith. In Fish Club we are exploring what this relationship means for us in our everyday life. We are learning that because God loves us, we can take risks as we see God's Spirit at work, whether it is to be a friend to the friendless or look for ways as a Fish Club group to care for our community.

In High Hopes, we are exploring similar themes. During our Unshowered events, we are studying a version of Rick Warren's The Purpose Driven Life aimed at youth, which teaches us to invite God into our exploration of how we use our time on earth. During our first High Hopes Unplugged meeting, we spent time discussing Peter walking on the

water and what ways God might be inviting us to take risks in our day to day lives too.

We are excited to see how God uses this theme to thread all of our time together, be it our discussions around a bonfire, time raking leaves for a neighbor, or even as we bake pies and Christmas cookies.



Hope Church to Engage in Big Read of To Kill a Mockingbird

During November Hope College is sponsoring a community-wide reading and discussion of Harper Lee's Pulitzer-prize-winning novel To Kill a Mockingbird. Among events featured are a lecture by Hope College history professor Fred Johnson, a discussion of the book by a panel at Hope Church, and a showing of the film based on the book.

Hope College associate professor Fred Johnson will open the Big Read with a keynote address in Winants Auditorium of Graves Hall on Monday, November 3 from 7 to 9 p.m. Titled, "Bathing in the Sunshine of Despair," his lecture will examine the historical reality that was the foundation and setting for *To Kill a Mockingbird*.

On Wednesday, November 5, from 7 to 9 p.m. at Hope Church Judy Parr will moderate a discussion of the novel. Whether you are a teenager or a golden-ager, whether you've read the book or are beginning to read

it, all are invited to learn more about this masterpiece of American literature. Come with your questions and your comments. We will consider what made the novel an immediate and long-time best seller, examine its themes of innocence and experience, justice and injustice (and more), and reflect on the book's continuing relevance into twenty-first century America.

On Tuesday, November 11, from 7 to 9:30 p.m. the Knickerbocker Theater will show the film version of *To Kill a Mockingbird* staring Gregory Peck. The free film will be followed by discussion at Hops at 84 East 8th Street.



Disability Awareness

We encounter people with disabilities throughout our lives: in our jobs, churches, schools and in passing on the street. You may have a loved one who has a disability. with disabilities are everywhere in our community. We co-exist with them, but do we understand their needs, enter into friendships or work relationships with them? Or are we afraid to deal with something we don't understand?

Truthfully, we are more the same than we are different. We are all created in God's image (Genesis 1:26). We have the same needs for food, water, clothing shelter, and intimacy. We all need to have a sense of purpose. We all need to feel that we belong. A church community is a great place for everyone to come together, learn from each other and grow in God's family.

We are one body and we need each and every member to remain healthy and vibrant (1 Corinthians 12:12).

A few years ago I started a job working with people who had mental illness. They lived in residential programs. Most of the people I worked with were diagnosed with schizoaffective disorder. I knew very little about this illness; most of my experience was working with dementia or depression, so I felt like I was in a little over my Some of them intimidated me. I did not know how to respond to some of the delusional thoughts or hallucinations that the residents had. These residents would come to my office and talk to me about their health issues. Gradually, I learned that they had a lot of the same concerns I had. They were concerned about their health, medication, relationships, finances and freedom. As I got to know them, I learned how to communicate better. I wasn't intimidated by their differences. In fact, I came to enjoy and appreciate them for who they were; people like me.

Dan Vander Plaats, director of

advancement, of Elim Christian Services gives us five stages towards disability awareness: ignorance, pity, care, friendship, and co-laborers. We live in an information society, so we can seldom claim ignorance, although I confess that in certain situations I have been ignorant as in my experience working with people with severe mental illness. are so many types of disabilities, no one will ever be above ignorance in all situations. Becoming friends and co-laborers requires persistence. takes energy to make friendships and maintain them with anyone. Accepting each other's weaknesses and limitations makes co-laboring together even harder. We will never be perfect, but we can reach towards the goal of friendship and co-laboring together by reaching out to each other, and God through perseverance in prayer.

In our weekly Monday morning staff meeting, a different member of the staff leads us all in devotions as we begin the week together. (By the way, just after staff meeting we gather in the hallway in front of the office for coffee time from 10am-10:30am. We welcome anyone to join us so if ever you are in the area stop by!) This past week, Barbara Joldersma shared an excerpt from Dietrich Bonhoeffer's book *Life Together* as she led us in devotions. In the excerpt, Bonhoeffer was speaking to fellow clergy but what he talked about is relevant to any of us. He was calling on us to cultivate spaciousness in our lives for the sake of being helpful to one another in the small, concrete, daily stuff of life. He was harshly criticizing those fellow clergy who think of themselves as doing such important work that they do not have time to lend a helping hand when they come across a person in need.

I've been pondering this all week and finding a deep resonance in my soul around this exhortation. Here's a few things I am noticing as I think about the times I have (and haven't) made myself available to this kind of helpfulness toward others. When I do, I am delighted by the feeling of appreciation that is exchanged. I feel connected to the person I am helping. That connection is as important to me as it is to the person I am helping. I also notice that I feel more open to receiving help too. I get out of the mode of thinking that everything is all up to me and I find myself welcoming the helping hand extended out in my direction. The simple act of slowing down, to step out of my agenda for the moment to step into another person's sphere, is also a deep blessing to my soul. Conversations happen that otherwise might

not occur. All of this strengthens the sacred bonds of shared life.

I ran across a quote by Joan Chittister that brought clarity to my meandering thoughts. She was actually talking about the blessing of shared meals together but I found her words descriptive of these moments of offering help and receiving help from one another in the course of daily life:

"It's at a meal where all of life comes together: talk, time, beauty, rest, and our awareness of our fascination with people and our need for one another."

Fascination with people and an awareness of our need for one another: that's how I would describe the blessing of helpfulness. Not a bad spin on what might otherwise sound like a pious exhortation to add to the long list of other things we "should" be doing in life! It is also a pretty wonderful way to frame what we are looking to cultivate when we come toward our Thanksgiving Tables as well.
