
#### **Season of Reconciliation**

# Rhonda's Hope Church Concert, and Other Musical Goings-On

I have a lot of local music-making planned for the winter and spring, and wanted to keep you all updated, in case you are interested in hearing me play outside the context of worship at Hope Church.

March will be a busy month for me. I have been excitedly planning my annual spring Hope Church concert, for Sunday afternoon, March 22 at 3pm. This will be an unusual concert, in that I will be playing exclusively music for organ and other instruments, and I've included some combinations one doesn't hear all the time, as well as more traditional combinations. Amanda Dykhouse (concertmistress of the Holland Symphony) will be playing violin, Sarah Southard (professor at Hope College) will be playing oboe/ english horn, Julie Sooy (professor at Hope College, and director of the West MI Flute Orchestra) will be playing flute, Brendan Bohnhorst (Holland Symphony) will be playing tuba, and Matt Beck (Calvin College and West Michigan Symphony) will be playing marimba. In case you were wondering, we will NOT all be playing one piece together! There will be pieces from various countries and eras for organ and single instruments.

The part I'm most excited about is the world premiere of a piece written by my friend and church music colleague at Grace Episcopal, Steve Jenkins. It's a piece for marimba and organ, which was composed over 10 years ago for a commission, but then for various reasons never performed. Steve's own unique musical voice is obvious in the music, with influences from jazz, modern composers like Steve Reich, as well as liturgical church music and organ literature throughout the centuries. I'm very excited to perform it, and look forward to sharing it with you! And how often does one hear music for marimba and organ?

As well in March, I've been ask to be a part of the Grand Rapids Bach Festival. Players from the GR Symphony will be playing with a few organists at the Calvin College chapel, playing some wonderful music for organ and orchestra, on Monday, March 16 at 8pm.

On Sunday, March 15 at 3pm at First Reformed, the local community choir for which I accompany, the Holland Chorale, will be doing excerpts from one of our past concerts, as a free public concert. And Sunday, April 19 at 3pm at First Reformed, I will be playing on the popular local series Free @ Three, with Holland French Horn player Greg Bassett, no stranger to Hope Church. This is the program that was snowed out last January (and this year, we didn't volunteer for a winter date!) Hope to see you at one of these local events!

My winter and spring will be mostly spent here in Holland, but I do have one trip planned. I will be flying to Chattanooga, TN to play at the Episcopal Cathedral there, on a wonderful organ built in a Baroque, northern European style. I will then head to Birmingham, AL, to give a lecture at Birmingham-Southern College, play a noontime recital at the Cathedral Church of the Advent, and see an old college friend who lives there with her family.

You may have seen, and certainly must have heard about the sharp rise in graffiti activity in the City of Holland in the last month or so. Someone or some group out there wants to make their mark and be heard. Their anonymous 'tagging' on every kind of building in our downtown has left residents with a haunted, invaded feeling. Who did that? Why did they? For whom is it intended? Whose property will be next? Who is on the move? This disconcerted feeling lingers even after the scrawls are painted out, fingers have been wagged, and the police have been called.

Negative, destructive activities like graffiti grab our attention and get us talking. Thinking. What does this mean to us? And even while we too are perturbed about the graffiti, we want to speak up and point out that signs of the Kingdom of God are all around us too. So let's point them out and let them make us think! I think of the woman who gave away one of

her coats to someone who had none; about a man who received help to replace the roof of his porch and avoid a fine from the city; about a neighbor bringing over a meal and initiating a friendship; about the folks I've seen shoveling their neighbors' driveways, just to be nice. Shine a light on those things! Let the Light shine through you. Say thank you to those whose light you see. What else have you seen?

One a much more practical note, as a simple response to the recent vandalism, WSN is rallying neighbors to leave an [LED] porch light on and show our care for the spaces around our homes.

# **Hope Church in the Community**

Keeping you informed of the agencies Hope Church supports through the Community Ministry Anne Saliers, Community Ministry Member

Playing an active role in revitalizing housing in our community, Jubilee Ministries Inc. is all about strengthening Holland's neighborhoods. Its work includes:

- Complete home renovations
- Owning and managing Midtown Center located at 95 West 15th Street
- Owning and overseeing the Renaissance Building at 501 West 17th Street in South Shore Village, home to several local businesses

Jubilee Ministries has renovated 25 houses which are now homeowner occupied. The houses they have rescued are ones that commercial developers aren't interested in and are too far gone for landlords. They're houses that have been empty for a long period of time and are in serious disrepair. Jubilee Ministries, together with Taking Root Ministries, renovates these houses and sells them for homeowner occupied properties. One of the houses is now a lovely home to Jill Russell and Andrew Bunnell and family. The profit from the sale of these homes is then reinvested into another purchase and the work continues, strengthening Holland's neighborhoods.



# **Kids Hope Update**

January was an eventful month for us. Among other things, we held our annual Kids Hope Appreciation Dinner and Workshop which is a time when all of our volunteers are invited to gather at our church for a time of fellowship and sharing. We share our Kids Hope stories over dinner and then take the time to

provide tips which have been helpful in our mentoring or in our efforts to communicate within our team (prayer partner, Kids Hope child, mentor) so that others may benefit from both our successes and our struggles. This is always a time of encouragement and problem-solving for both long-time and relatively new mentors.

We also completed the first step in the process which enables many of our Vanderbilt Kids Hope students to spend a week at Camp Geneva. Thanks to many generous donors, Camp Geneva is able to provide large scholarships to Kids Hope campers who are entering grades 4-6 in the fall. We ask the parents of our Kids Hope students to provide \$50 towards the remaining camp costs if they are able to do so and our very supportive congregation provides the rest of

the necessary funds for overnight campers. Donations to our camp fund by members of the congregation also enable us to offer scholarships so that our Kids Hope children who are entering grades 2-3 can attend Day Camp.

Last year, we were able to send 7 children to Geneva Shores (overnight camp) and 3 children to Day Camp. We are so grateful that we can provide our Vanderbilt students with this chance to make new friends and grow in their spiritual commitment, sense of independence, social skills, and self-esteem. And we know we cannot do it without you. Thanks for being a part of our Hope Church Kids Hope Team and for your generous gifts, which make this opportunity to share God's love possible.

# The Congregational Care Ministry

Many groups at Hope Church provide care and support for persons in the Hope Church family, but the Congregational Care Ministry seeks to support all persons in a caring and loving community of faith in all events of life. The Ministry members along with the pastors, the church nurse and Consistory members are dedicated to address both the needs and joys of the Hope Church family.

The Ministry assigns all persons who attend Hope Church to one of twelve Care Groups. Each Group is served by a member of the Ministry and by an elder and a deacon from Consistory. If you do not know which group you are in, look behind your name in the Church Directory. Behind the front page of the Directory, the leadership team is identified for each Care Group.

Each Care Group finds its own way to stay in tune with members' lives and needs. Contact the pastors, group leaders or the church office when you seek ways to connect to the life of Hope Church or find yourself in need of care or support. The Ministry will arrange meals, transportation or other resources in times of need. Care groups also provide Prayer Shawls from the Knitting Ministry during times of extended illness as a way of sharing a sense of God's peace and healing.

To assist people living in retirement settings, the Ministry provides bus

transportation for each Sunday worship service and special events after the service. Recognizing the need for expanded transportation services, the Consistory has approved additional funding for this. Please let your Care Group leader or the church office know if there are events at church which you wish to attend but require transportation. To promote the engagement of persons in the life of the church, the ministry arranges for a time of sharing through coffee events three times a year at Freedom Village, Warm Friend and Resthaven locations.

A special effort is made to maintain relationships with people who are no longer able to participate in church life. Besides personal visits, opportunities are arranged for communion to be given in their homes by the elders. Flowers are distributed at Easter and Christmas as well as Christmas cards, cookies and caroling at Christmas time.

The Health Ministry, which is part of the Congregational Care Ministry but functions separately, provides a specific focus on faith and health through adult education programs, blood pressure clinics, medical equipment and flu shots.

Because the Ministry assigns two persons to each of the twelve groups, the Ministry is a large team and is always welcoming new members. While many people in the congregation have contributed to the function of the Ministry, it is presently served by:

# **Design Work for Living Hope Underway**

Hope Church re-engaged with Elevate Studio in December, which led to January being spent in gathering more specific design requirements for the refinement and further development of the plans for the Living Hope renovation. During February, that design work will be underway, with the intention to share updated plans with the congregation in March.

In January, Consistory determined how to allocate donations among

the four projects we plan to support through the capital campaign. This portion of the campaign recognizes both that our facility enables us to support our community and that we share a mission with others beyond our walls. Greenpoint Reformed Church, will receive 30 percent of the benevolent portion; the Haiti Foundation Against Poverty will receive 25 percent for building a permanent home for orphans. The remaining 45 percent will be divided between New Community/ Fourth Reformed and Maple Ministries in Holland: Avenue both are engaged in neighborhood development and both have facility renovations or restorations.

During February, you'll see more communication from the Living Hope capital campaign. While donations and pledges have already been received, the campaign will officially open on February 15. We'll assess our progress at the end of May, with the hope that Consistory can affirm or adjust the scope of the project.

In the meantime, updates are posted on the project website, which is at LivingHopeRCA. Wordpress.com or through the link on the Happenings page on the Hope Church website. Your ideas and comments are welcome, submitted through the website, by email, conversation, or through the church office.

# **Prayer Shawls**

Knitting prayer shawls is a ministry – a ministry that does not expect anything in return. What does return to you are amazing blessings that one would never think possible.

A Prayer Shawl is a covering of knitted yarn, full of prayer, mystery and peace. It is knit with love and prayers to remind the wearer of a CIRCLE OF CARE without boundaries. Wearing a prayer shawl lets the prayers of the maker seep into the yarn as it is being made and then be transferred to the receiver, giving them the feeling of being safe, loved and held in prayer.

Hope Church's Prayer Shawl Ministry was started by Nancy Rock just before 2000. Remember the group of ladies sitting in the Gathering Area on Sunday mornings, knitting and talking many years ago? Originally the shawl knitting ministry was created by Vicky Cole-Galo and Janet Bristow in 1998. They are both graduates of the Women's Leadership Institute at Hartford Seminary in Connecticut. At graduation they were encouraged to carry on the spirit of the class through some kind of project. At first they knit shawls for new mothers and women with breast cancer. The word spread and soon shawls were being knit for many purposes, including important celebrations.

One of the prayers used by Hope Church members as they knit is:

"Creator God, may this shawl be

a sign of your healing presence: may it warm those who are weary, surround those who suffer and encircle those who are in pain. May your gentle touch reach out to heal in the light of Christ. Amen."

We hope that our Congregational Care Group leaders will give these shawls to our members and friends who experience illness, a death in their immediate family or are stressed by caregiving or other family situations.

For directions on knitting a prayer shawl ask at the Hope Church office or contact Ann Anderson. Health Ministry hopes many of you will be inspired to join the knitting ministry.

### TIME TO LISTEN: DENISE KINGDOM GRIER

W.E.B. Du Bois in 1903 said well what both sides of the black/white race debate must understand:

"It is not enough for the Negroes to declare that colorprejudice is the sole cause of their social condition, nor for the white South to reply that their social condition is the main cause of prejudice. They both act as reciprocal cause and effect...Both must change, or neither can improve to any great extent."


I am a bridge. A flawed, broken, biased, and sinful bridge. On one side I listen to understand and express love for my white brothers and sisters who try hard to love black bodies and black ways without actually seeing black at all—who benefit from genocide, patriarchy, slavery, the GI Bill, FHA loans, imperialism, white supremacy, and white privilege in general. I really do love them. Not by

word only, but by worshiping to the tune of their music, excusing comments that pierce my soul, and by giving freely of my experience, my story and my time to be a bridge.

I am a bridge. On the other side there is the need for me to confront, candidly and discreetly, the ills of people of color—mostly black people. I was reared in the black church, moved to a segregated south, went to a historically black college and have beautiful black children. But I am not blind to the faces of black people who commit violent crimes in our cities; I am not deaf to the ignorance that I often hear flowing from the lyrics of our music; and I am not unaware of the academic statistics that report black children as exponentially under-resourced, undereducated, and under-motivated. A simple lesson in American history will help explain how we arrived at this place, but even I grow weary of trying to move forward when internalized oppression holds us back. So I get to be a bridge.

As the nation divides over recent verdicts concerning black men slain by police officers on the streets in our country, I stand as a swaying bridge. I am weary from sitting in services that exclude my tradition; tired from standing up for black children viewed as a problem before they even speak; weak from bearing the burden of both white guilt and black indifference; and bowed from the anger, hate, and injury hurled from one side to the other. I am a bridge with no toll—the racial tax never gets paid for being the first (or only) bridge nearby. My car gets pulled over by police for no reason, my voice gets muted by the majority, my experience is discredited in church, and my history is denied in America. Yet I still stand as a bridge because God has placed me in these two denominations, at this time in history, to be one.
