The wind of the Spirit was surely present. Seemed to meet us at the entrance. Or did we bring It with us? It made Its presence felt for five hours- different than ever before at our Holland PRIDE Festival. Seemingly It rode the wind through everyone circling the sidewalks.

The only serious conversations were in celebration for fulfillment of hopes through Friday's Supreme Court decision, gratitude for the dispersement of inequality and for future freedom for LGBT persons, and quiet talk about love's new acknowledgment and possibilities for known persons and couples.

Oh, but the Spirit whipped through in

the multitude of happy hugs, the escalation of laughter, the appearances of rainbows at every turn, the tempo and tone of the melodies, the delight in empathizing with those personally rejoicing, the upbeat of conversations, the adorning of clothing with symbols togetherness, and the worthfulness everyone felt at being there at such a timely occasion.

The police officers, anticipating possible protesters, simply watched the vibrant activity. People ate and drank more than comfort food. More diversity of persons appeared among us. Children of gay and lesbian couples swung arms with their parents. Plans for the future were revealed. An array of 50 sponsors stood forth. Cordiality abounded. Hopes are no longer fear-coated.

Oh, everyone knew some people in the community were shaking heads, possibly angry or planning protests, not understanding or having arrived at the place we had. But everyone there was relieved and grateful to be experiencing a community of equality now recognized across our land.

Faith, hope and love permeated the atmosphere. "Life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness" seemed to have become more real.

Moving Forward with Living Hope Facilities Renovation

As communicated following their June meeting, Consistory has approved moving forward with the Living Hope facilities renovation project. Their decision was based on the "superb" and "tremendous" progress toward the fundraising goal, as measured by both dollars and the number of donors.

After some discussion about design intent and resources available, Consistory also specified that the elevator to the second floor of the education wing, previously listed as an "alternate," be formally included in the project scope. Without it, they

felt, we had not accomplished our goal of "welcoming all."

Fundraising will continue until the goal is met; if you have not yet made a pledge, contact the church office to be a part of this next chapter in our history together! If you have pledged, you will see progress in payment of that pledge on your regular giving statements.

Elevate Studio, the architect for the project, has been re-engaged; our relationship with Elzinga & Volkers has been formalized with a contract for construction management. The team

is currently assessing which parts of the plan might be accomplished this fall, before the major construction season; and outlining the milestones for the process, based on an intention to be ready to request bids for the major construction by January 15. That date positions us well for competitive prices and for breaking ground as soon as spring arrives.

The Living Hope Design Team will recommence its work in mid-August, at which point the project blog, at LivingHopeRCA.wordpress.com or linked from the Hope Church website, will again be active with updates.

- If you or someone you know is having surgery
- If you are dealing with a loss or

- If you are in need of prayer

- If you are looking for ways to improve your health
- If you need someone to listen


Tom and I lived in Nairobi, Kenya for six

At my last church, I even had the consistory role-playing and dancing!

I am humbled to have been elected an elder at Hope Church and to have

been asked to work with Gordon to provide pastoral care to Hope Church congregants and to support the Congregational Care and Health Ministries during Jill's sabbatical. I see pastoral care as an opportunity to walk alongside individuals and families, at their invitation, during significant moments in their lives—to be present, to listen, and together to pray and bear witness to God's grace. I look forward to our time in this season and ask for your prayers for the Holy Spirit's filling and guidance as we journey together in this new way for a while

Deacons' Fund: Help from the "Yellow Envelopes"

Often our pastors or the staff encounter someone with a need—money for food, gas to get to a job interview, counseling to help with a family situation—and want to help. Thank goodness for your generous support of the Deacons' Fund! It gives the staff a source of ready cash to respond right away. (If the amount needed is large, the Senior Deacon is consulted before assistance is given.)

When you put a little something in that yellow offering envelope every couple of months, you help replenish this fund that is used for our members and others from the community who find themselves needing a little help. Need takes many forms, such as utility payments to prevent gas or water shutoff, a rent payment so someone doesn't lose their home, or furniture and appliances to make a new place livable—as well as the usual food and gas.

August 2 is the next designated offering envelope, but if you feel led to give at other times, don't let the lack of a yellow envelope stop you. Just

use any envelope and write "Deacons' Fund" on the outside (or on the check memo line).

The deacons monitor this fund at our meetings and plan to submit a report to the congregation at the end of the year highlighting some of the ways the money has been used.

The Caring for Creation Ministry

Teens say the most interesting things. One of my favorite "fly on the wall" moments came when I was driving Middle Schoolers from Mt. Pisgah to Teusink's Farm this past May. We had a jam-packed day, which started with an Appalachian Trail practice hike right after church and ended with our end of the year Fish Club party at the farm. I had the pleasure of having mostly boys in my vehicle and in the span of our 20-minute ride, they covered a range of conversation topics from their favorite formationof-the-universe film documentary, to the latest video games they had tried, to reigning scientific theories making the existence of zombies feasible. These are not topics most adults entertain and I could barely keep the grin off my face as I glanced at their passion and intensity in my rear view mirror.

This would not be the last time I would witness the beauty of this passion and intensity. Our High Hopes group has been meeting this summer for a series of coffee shop discussions. Each week, we meet for smoothies, a time of catching up, and to discuss a different theological issue. Kind of like Pub Theology, but well, without the pub. I admit that I was a bit nervous to try this. Would anyone show up in the middle of their busy summer? Would anyone feel comfortable sharing their opinions on deep topics and in front of their peers? Would anyone care at all?

I should have known better. Not only were there ten teens who joined us that first week, there was so much lively discussion I had to shut it down in order that the youth could go to their waiting rides. Our topic that first week was "Spiritual doubts" and much was said and asked regarding what it means to be a person who is in relationship with Christ, but still has doubts about how this faith plays out in one's life and world. The willingness to engage this tension with such a sense of mystery was inspiring. Oh that you too could have been a fly on that coffee shop wall, to view the passion and intensity that is so evident in the hearts and minds of our young people. God's spirit is at work among us indeed, be it in talks about



Neighborhood Connection

The Neighborhood Connector role for Washington School Neighborhood, which Hope Church has been supporting for the past several years and which I currently inhabit 20 hrs a week, is a bit hard to explain (at least in detail). I thought I'd share a connection story to help paint the picture as well as celebrate what I consider a success.

At the end of June Hope Church hosted

two Youth Connections crews from the City of Holland to do work for one week. One of these crews was donated to WSN. Part of my job as connector is to connect people and organizations for the benefit of residents. So in preparation for this week, I began to seek out job opportunities that would benefit neighbors.

The City of Holland had informed me that a house on 9th St. was in need of some attention for multiple violations, so when I investigated I found that it was my friend and neighbor Juan (who had just invited me to his 75th birthday party, and whose wife had been in and out of the hospital). His property needed painting and yard clean-up among other things. Fortunately, another non-profit organization in

the City, Homecor, had set aside some funds for WSN for just this type of project. I secured a dumpster through their funds to be dropped at Juan's house for three days, and the youth crew filled it up with his and another neighbor's items that needed removal, as well as getting a fair bit done on painting the garage. Who was involved? Hope Church, City of Holland, Escape Ministries, Homecor, WSN, and neighbors Juan and Polly, at least.

Juan was grateful. Polly was grateful. The City of Holland was grateful. One of the youth said he wanted my job. And it was all done in a spirit of personal relationship, built trust, and respect.

Trail Mix; Teens, Tears, and Triumph

The Hope Church Appalachian Trail tradition has been an event spanning many years and many generations of young Fish Clubbers (26 years--200 kids and adults--1100 miles).

Through it our young people have been shown an environment that has been mostly foreign to them and most come to realize they have far more strength and perseverance than they thought they had. All learn how to live, and thrive, for a few days without stores, hair dryers, purified running water, electronic toys, and, devastating to some, flush toilets. Occasionally they are homesick and tears are not unknown, which is an important learning rite of passage.

We have established an adventure forum that gives our young people and adults too, an experience they won't soon forget even if they never sleep in a tent or hike in the rain or achieve a summit climb again. The hike is not without risks and some adults may question whether these risks are justifiable for such young people. I believe they are. Although they are completely immersed in wild natural areas with rocks, roots, mud, poison ivy, slippery stream crossings, water borne giardiasis, and are at times a long way from civilization, they are also surrounded by a caring experienced group of adult leaders who DO understand the risks and prepare for them appropriately.

Our annual adventure affects our young people in a variety of ways. A few steadfastly vow NEVER to go again. Others make the same vow, but by early spring, when the blister pain and wet socks are a distant memory and they've had another birthday, again rise to the Appalachian Trail challenge. Many will go until their three year tenure in middle school is

over. Recently some young people actually ask for another year or two beyond their Fish Club years!

I'm glad that we have taken the risks and are still introducing our kids to the mountains. I continue to marvel each year at the adults who commit to the responsibility of leading these young people. It probably has something to do with comments our young people make. Comments like:

"I never saw a view like this one!"
"I didn't think I'd make it, but I did!"
"Thanks!"
And, best of all,
"I'm going again next year!"

Thanks be to God for watching over us and keeping us safe. Thank you Hope Church folks for giving me the opportunity to be part of the A/T scene for so many years.


