Living Hope Project Making Strides

At its September meeting, the RCA Holland Classis approved our plan for financing our facility renovation project through construction, as pledges are received. That approval was the last requirement to be fulfilled to assure that resources are in place as construction begins. Our financing is through the RCA Growth Fund, which uses income for benevolence, extending the influence of Living Hope.

The Design Team is grateful that arrangements are complete, because much Design and Development progress has been made, detailing intentions and visions so that actual construction documents can

be produced. The architect and engineering team has been crawling around in attics and basements to confirm or flesh out the representations of our building on historic drawings. Some adjustments have been required as structural complications have been uncovered, but the overall intent of the design phase is still intact.

There are many steps to be completed, including approval of a site plan and from the Historic District, but the Design Team plans to share their completed work on November 15 and 22 in the Gathering Area. Plan to stop by!

Sacristy Guild

Do you ever wonder who keeps the sanctuary in good order? Is someone really responsible to make sure the hymnals and Bibles are all organized and facing the same way? It's true. Someone takes the time each week to prepare the sanctuary for worship. The group who is in charge of this is called "The Sacristy Guild." The work of the Sacristy Guild is to ensure that our sanctuary reflects the holiness and the joy that we all create together in worship.

In preparing for each service the guild members need to change paraments (Ecclesiastical vestments or hangings—they are hanging from each pulpit along with the covering of the altar/table in front of the sanctuary), set out communion ware, make sure the cross is in place, set out the Paschal candle if needed,

mark liturgical readings in the pulpit and lectern Bibles, and organize pew hymnals and Bibles.

The Sacristy Guild also helps with placing artwork throughout the church, as well as cleaning the linens after a communion service, polishing the silver communion ware when needed, taking the wax out of the votive candle holders, and helping to prepare and then clean the homebound communion kits. We work with the Worship, Prayer and Spirituality Ministry; our pastors, Gordon and Jill; Amy Sall sends us instructions each week as to what needs to be done; our resident artists, Kari Miller-Fenwood and Rachelle Oppenhuizen; and Ric Beltran, our custodian/caretaker. With all of us working together, we prepare the sanctuary for our regular services,

weddings, funerals, baptisms, concerts, and special events.

The members of the Sacristy Guild are Linda Tiemstra Cook, Judy Werkman, Michelle Gerig, Nancy Rock and Joyce Teusink. We would like to thank Rose Mary Cantor for her time of service with us. We wish her well in her retirement. If you have any questions regarding Sacristy Guild, or would like to help in any way, please contact Joyce Teusink, chairperson of Hope Church Sacristy Guild. In closing, the word "sacristy" stems from the Latin "sacer," or "sacred." The Holland Drop In Center was started in 1999 by a group of area consumers...adults with mental illness (schizophrenia, bipolar disorder, depression and the like) to provide a place for people to gather who had emotional or mental health issues. Supported by Ottawa County Mental Health, the Holland Drop in Center is a place that provides encouragement to individuals with mental illness to interact and participate while supporting each other in their personal mental health. We provide an atmosphere of calm, relaxing and

non-judgmental acceptance. It is important for us as a consumer-run agency to have a safe, supportive, and productive environment so we can share our accomplishments and ideas to make recovery possible.


The Holland Drop in Center focuses on the beliefs that a person with a mental illness does not have to feel isolated from the community or society. Recovery is the belief that you have the right to live a successful and fulfilling life. The reason behind the idea of a consumer-run Center is that by working together and sharing

experiences, consumers are able to best help each other. Because many individuals in the mental health system do not have the support of family and their friends,

consumer peers play a big role in helping them put their lives back together. Because they share the same pain, they can offer each other support and real empathy. They can work together to find solutions and alleviate fear.

"Our help is in the name of the LORD who made heaven and earth."

Those words from Psalm 124 often begin the liturgy at Hope Church. Have you ever noticed or wondered in that verse why the word "LORD" is in small caps like that? Last month Pastor Jill (God bless her on her sabbatical!) wrote about some responses to and input about worship at Hope Church, and I would like to continue that theme. This is something of a guide to the different ways we talk about God in our liturgy, and the reflection that is of biblical language.

Here's a basic primer on names for God in Scripture that are often seen in our liturgy:

• YHWH ~ this is the special revealed name of God in the Old Testament, spelled with the 4 Hebrew consonants Y-H-W-H = the letters are read from right to left in Hebrew). This name for God cannot be fully known or pronounced, as the vowels for the name are uncertain. It is often • said as "Yahweh" but that is an approximation (fyi - this name previously transliterated as "Jehovah" in the King James Bible but that is now seen as an inaccurate expression of the name). The Hebrew scripture authors treated the name YHWH with such regard that they did not write it, but rather used the Hebrew word 'Adonai'/Lord in its place. Then in the version of

the Bible we use in English, the editors use "LORD" in small caps to alert us that this is a stand in for YHWH. So, when in our liturgy you see "LORD" used in a quote from Scripture (most often in a Psalm), then you know that we are expressing that this is a reference to the special revealed name of God, YHWH.

- El/Eloah/Elohim ~ these are the singular and plural words for "God" in Hebrew. These words reflect the generic expression of "god" in that culture, but particularly when "Elohim" is used in Scripture it expresses God as the true God in contrast to other gods. So in our liturgy when it says "LORD God", that is a translation in Scripture of "YHWH Elohim", and as such is expressing 'the one true God is YHWH'. Or when we simply use "God" it is an expression of "Elohim" (in the Greek New Testament this word for God is carried forward as "Theos").
- Adonai ~ this is the Hebrew word for "Lord", in reference to a ruler. When you see the word "Lord" in the Old Testament (when it is not in small caps!) and liturgy, this is New Testament Greek, "Lord" = "Kurios", and this is brought together. forward as a title often uses for Jesus, which also reflects the Peace, cultural meaning of a "Lord" as a Gordon person in charge of others.

Christ/Messiah ~ We often use the title "Jesus Christ" in our liturgy. The word "Christ" is the Greek translation of the Hebrew word "Messiah". "Messiah" means "anointed one" and it was the term used in Judaism for the promised one from God who would rule with righteousness and peace. In the Gospels, Jesus is expressed as the fulfillment of this messianic promise from God. So whenever we use the term "Christ" it is an expression of the Hebrew word and concept of "Messiah". And when we say "Christ the Lord", it is expressing Jesus Christ as the presence of the Lord God with us (i.e. Luke 2: "a Savior who is Christ the Lord").

Got all that?! It's not meant to be confusing or fancy, but something that can be meaningful as we are aware of the language for God that we are given and that we use. When you know the reasons and meanings wrapped up in some of the language for God, it connects us in a deeper way to a rich story of revelation and faith stretching back through millennia. And I hope it helps to see also the care and intention we use in our liturgy which we prepare to be (as Pastor a title for God that refers to God's Jill said) "the work of the people" as authority and supremacy. In the we worship our God (YHWH/Elohim/ Adonai/Theos/Kurios/Messiah/Christ)
