Adult Education: November

Sundays, 9:40-10:40 a.m. in Commons I

November 1-15: Avodah - Exploring the Christian View

What is our calling from God and how do we discern it? In what ways do all kinds of work—paid, unpaid, pre-retirement, post-retirement—provide us with the opportunity to serve the world? Led by **Dr. Tracy Brower**, Global VP of Workplace Vitality for Mars, Inc., and author of Bring Work to Life by Bringing Life to Work, and **Rev. Keith Derrick**, recently retired Director of Journey: Center for Continual Learning at Western Theological Seminary, we will explore this intersection in our session.

Nov 1: Creating God – We will explore how God as the creator also calls us to create in the world and how we discern all that God intends for us.

Nov 8: Relating Christ – We will discuss how Christ sets an example for our relationships with each other and the ways in which relationships offer precious opportunities for contribution and impact in the world.

Nov 15: Transforming Spirit – Week three will be focused on how the spirit works within us and the ways that we manifest our giftedness in the world – honoring the spirit in ourselves and in others.

November 22–29: The RCA and Us: Is There Room for Hope?

Nov 22: Don Luidens, retired professor of sociology at Hope College, will present the current state of the RCA. He will show membership trends and discuss their implications.

Nov 29: A panel, moderated by Milt Nieuwsma, will discuss Hope Church's relationship to the RCA. Judy Parr and Lynn Japinga will discuss the history of our congregation's relationship with the denomination. Larry Schuyler and Marlin VanderWilt will discuss the present status and speculations about the future.

You have probably heard the story of the traveler that taught the village how to make stone soup. One day she wandered into a village after a long hard day's hike and needed something to eat, but couldn't find anyone willing to share what they had. "Sorry," she kept hearing, "there's only enough for me and my family." After several unsuccessful attempts, she had a bold idea. She set up her cooking equipment in the center of the square, put on the water to boil, and began to look about on the ground and poke along the hedges. Curious, some of the children approached her to ask what she was doing. "I'm looking for

the perfect stone for stone soup," she replied. "Can we help?" they asked. "Certainly," she said. So together they kept looking. By and by one of the children found what they were looking for - a round stone, slightly larger than a chicken's egg. "Perfect!" she cried.

By now they had gathered a few more curious onlookers, so as she carefully set the stone into the boiling water and began to stir, she mentioned, "Now stone soup is good by itself, but it's even better with some onion."

"I have an onion!" exclaimed one of the onlookers, "I'll get it!"

"Fantastic!" she said. "And what would

make it even better is some carrots." "I have a couple carrots we could put in!" said another.

And so, little by little, out of their curiosity, the villagers brought what they had to share for the stone soup. By the time it was ready, it was very tasty indeed! And everyone got a bowl.

Washington School Neighbors recently had a small stone soup moment at our Salsa Garden party in September. We were making the salsa fresh and had forgotten garlic, so one of the neighbors said, "I'll bring some." Another neighbor across the street saw our bowls of chips and asked if we liked quacamole. We did. She disappeared, and a few minutes later came back with a bowl of freshly made quac. Their contributions made the evening that much better, we all enjoyed the salsa and quacamole, and as we were preparing to pack up to leave I heard these two neighbors, who lived across from each other, finish up their conversation by saying, "Well, it was nice to meet you!" The good will and the gifts are there-sometimes they just need a platform to be discovered and shared.

Organ and Flute Concert

On Sunday, Nov 22 at 3pm, Hope Church will be hosting a concert with Rhonda on organ and three flute ensembles - Hope College Flute Choir, Flutes Soli (a pre-college student group) and Great Lakes Flutes (made up of members of the West Michigan Flute Orchestra). The flutes will be playing pieces by themselves, and there will be three ensemble pieces

with flutes and organ - an arrangement of Albioni's Adagio for Strings, a movement from Guillmant's Organ Concerto, arranged for flutes instead of orchestra, and a piece written especially for Rhonda and Julie Sooy (director of the West Michigan Flute Orchestra), titled Whistling Thirds. Whistling Thirds was written by Barry Jordan, distinguished organist and

cathedral musician in Magdeburg, German. Jordan hails from South Africa, and is an accomplished composer as well as organist. He has written a fun, jaunty piece for flutes and organ that shows off many characteristics and idiomatic sounds of both instruments. Come out for an afternoon of great music!

Talons Out Honor Flight

On September 26th I had the privilege of escorting my father, Clarence Hopkins, on a Honor Flight to Washington D.C. Talons Out, an organization based out of Kalamazoo, flies WWII veterans to see the World War II memorial at no cost to the veteran. Our flight consisted of 84 men and women veterans plus their

guardians and support staff.

After arriving in D.C., we went Arlington Cemetery to see the changing guard of the and the laying of a wreath at Tomb the the Unknown Soldier. was a moving experience. Next was the WWII memorial where a group photo was taken. The outpouring "thanks for your service" unbelievable. We then visited the Korean and

Vietnam memorials. At the Vietnam Memorial I found Spencer Freestone's name. He was a classmate at Holland High and a good friend. He will not be forgotten.

We then traveled to the Woman in Military, Iwo Jima and Air Force

Memorials before boarding our flight back to Kalamazoo for a welcome home party. A long day but the experience was well worth it. To see these veterans who never knew each other until the night before our flight become friends, it was truly amazing.

I would like to thank my dad and all the other WWII veterans for their service. To see them get the welcome back they deserved was quite emotional.

WGVU is doing a documentary on the Honor Flight and interviewed Dad and I. They were looking for some human interest and Talons Out gave them our name since we were Fatherson and WWII-Vietnam veterans. They traveled with us and shot video throughout the day. The documentary should air around Veterans Day.

There are organizations all over the country that send WWII veterans to D.C. It was a wonderful experience that I was proud to share with dad.

Clarence Hopkins died on October 19 at the age of 95, one day shy of his 96th birthday. He was surrounded by his loving family at the time of his death. Clarence "Hoppy" Hopkins was a life-long member of Hope Church, and we give thanks to God for his faithful life. A memorial service was held on October 31 at Hope Church.

During the family church school, families will be given some ideas that they may want to adopt to help them share their blessings with others. Make this a special time to make a better faith connection with your family.


Hope Church Members Receive Awards

"...And What Matters at the End"

Earl Laman, Health Ministry Member



Well, that seems like a dreary title for a Health Ministry article. We try to champion that "The Glory of God is a person fully alive". Here's the whole title of a book some of us have read and believe is a landmark for being "fully alive" while aging and being cared for:

"BEING MORTAL: Medicine and What Matters at the End"

This book was written by a very dissatisfied and awakened physician, Dr. Atul Gawande, a compassionate son of a prominent physician, who was startled to learn what his parents and patients were headed for in aging.

He writes: "I find that neither I nor my

patients find our current state (of care for the aging) tolerable." And then: "I have the writer's and scientist's faith, however, that by pulling back the veil and peering in close, a person can make sense of what is most confusing or strange or disturbing."

"I wrote this book in the hope of understanding what has happened"....."Lacking a coherent view of how people might live successfully all the way to their very end, we have allowed our fates to be controlled by the imperatives of medicine, technology, and strangers."

This is a human story really, not a text, but a tracing of very personal concerns well illustrated by family and personal experiences. Not morbid, not dreary, it is very readable and filled with relatable stories.

You will find it an eye-brow raiser, a mind-opener, a heart-warmer, and a hope-instiller that will arouse many "Amen!" moments.

Dr. Gawande saw that the three "afflictions" of aging were "boredom, loneliness and helplessness" and that "institutionalized routines and safety" were key priorities rather than "making life worth living."

We are mortal, but totally human all our days. Dr. Gawande became keenly aware of the "inner person" in the aging who needs to be recognized, regarded, listened to, and treated as a feeling, needful, desiring, deciding, belonging being.

Dr. Gawande's personal expression: "I never expected that among the most meaningful experiences I'd have as a doctor- and, really, as a human beingwould come from helping others deal with what medicine cannot do as well as what it can."

If you aren't concerned about aging or about anyone else who is, you need not open this book. However......

Bounded Set/Centered Set

"Let us fix our eyes on Jesus, the author and finisher of our faith..." -Hebrews 12:2

One of our members Curtis Gruenler recently passed along an article written by one of his friends and colleagues which touched on an important image of faith I'd like to share. It's actually two contrasting images of how we might approach faith.

Picture for the first image a circle in the middle of the page. Inside and outside of this circle all over the page are small dots representing people. This is "bounded set" faith. It is defined by who is in or who is out, and the focus is on the line-not crossing the line, getting other people to cross the line, watching to see if others cross the line. Faith in this image is making sure we are inside the circle, and seeing if we can get others to come in with us.

The second image is a dot in the center of page. The smaller dots around it are the same as in the first image, but this time there is no circle in or out, but rather arrows showing which direction these dots are facing and moving. This is a "centered set." In this image the center is Jesus, and the smaller dots represent people in motion. As Curtis's friend Dave says, "There is no 'in' or 'out' because there is no circle."

These images challenge us to consider where we are fixing our eyes. Are we fixing our eyes on dividing lines, hedges, and moral regulations to discover who belongs? Or are we fixing our eyes on a most beautiful center, a Savior, irresistibly attractive who might even be captivating someone else's gaze who knows him by a different name?

Depending on where we are fixing our gaze, our "important" questions might be vastly different. As Dave notes, "The stakes of centered-set faith...are pragmatic (are we finding actual life and encouragement in Jesus? Are our lives getting better?) rather than moral (are we succeeding in keeping a list of religious rules? Do we hold the right religious opinions?)"1

Concerning ourselves with who is in or who is out, or whether we are in or out is not life-giving, and sounds like the Pharisees Jesus criticized. My hope for faith echoes that of the writer of Hebrews: Let us fix our eyes on Jesus.

First Sunday of Advent: November 29
