This year, in Christian Education classes and through our annual fund campaign, we will use the metaphor of "living stones" to help us remember that, while our building may evolve in exciting new ways, in the greater scheme of things, it is the lives of all of us which create this wonderful "spiritual house" that is the Church.

As you consider your annual pledge for the future of Hope Church, keep in mind that we are like living stones, building our spiritual house together. For several years we have used the image of a three-legged stool (representing our annual fund drive, our capital campaign, and our endowment) to remind each other of the many ways in which we support our spiritual house. You will be receiving a letter later this month regarding our annual fund drive. It includes a number of budget related matters for you to review as you reflect on how you can

be a "living stone" contributor to the "spiritual house" that is Hope Church.

This October we plan to follow an informational and budgeting process similar to last year:

- You will receive a copy of the 2017 budget in your stewardship mailing later this month.

- invited to bring your pledge form to church on Stewardship Sunday, November 13, or you can mail it to the church office by that date.
- On Sunday, January 15, there will be a congregational meeting to discuss and vote on the final 2017 budget. Through these last months of 2016 there will also be regular updates on weekly contributions toward our 2016 commitments.

Caring for Creation Corner

Do you feel the spark of electricity in the air? No, it is not the changing seasons I'm referencing. Rather, it is the work of Hope Church congregant, Peter Boogaart in his new role as the City of Holland's first-ever residential energy adviser for the Home Energy Retrofit Program which launches October 1. The program ties together several core parts of our faith: caring for the least of those among us and caring for creation. Peter was featured in the recent Groundwork article "Holland Energy Plan Scores Its First Big Win" and said that "one of the wonderful things about our Plan is

that it can take the energy economic burden off of people who need the most relief."

To enable low income residents to take part in this program, the city created the Holland Energy Fund with \$3 million set aside to help lower interest rates. Other funds are reserved to provide a 20 percent match for projects costing over \$10,000. Any customer, including many most banks would ignore, can qualify simply by having a one-year perfect record on utility bills and no debt-related legal troubles. The terms are 4.9 to 5.9 percent for up

to 15 years. The city has changed state law to facilitate on-bill financing of energy efficiency projects. This means that someone could improve the comfort of their home and lower their energy use and pay it back slowly over time on the same bill they already pay every month. Often the lower energy use means that the bill ends up being the same or lower than it was before.

Peter helps walk people through the entire process. "I'll be there on behalf of homeowners to make it as streamlined as possible," he promises. "One-stop shopping, financing,

technical questions, especially when they get a full home energy evaluation. You can sit down with the city—that's me—and learn what it all really means."

Lastly, if you weren't already excited about the new power plant, you are about to be! The plant isn't completed and it's already been awarded the prestigious Institute for Sustainable Infrastructure's Envision Platinum Award, its top rating, which has gone to just 15 projects, and never to a

power plant. The award was given due to the high attention given to sustainability during all facets of the project, such as removing 11.5 tons of asbestos, collecting 296 tires, crushing 12,600 tons of concrete and masonry material for onsite reuse, and steering 14,000 tons of material away from landfills. Moreover the natural gas powered plant will be more efficient than most, due to plans to use waste heat to melt snow on miles of sidewalks and streets and also to heat buildings.

So the next time you feel a spark in the air, appreciate the passing wonder of summer turning into fall, but also take a moment to reflect on how much progress Holland is making toward its Community Energy Plan goal of reducing gas and electric use by 50% by 2050. With all of us reducing energy use as best we can and with help from community leaders like Peter, that distant dream is one step closer to becoming reality.


A New Heaven and a New Earth: Reclaiming Biblical Eschatology

Steve Bouma-Prediger will lead us through a new way of understanding what the Bible says about end times. In God's good future, will Christians be whisked off the earth and the earth be burned up to nothing? What does biblical hope really look like? In this class we will explore these (and other) questions with the help of Richard Middleton's A New Heaven and a New Earth. Over against the all-too-common eschatology of heavenly rapture and earthly destruction, this book reclaims the scriptural vision of cosmic renewal. Reading A New Heaven and a New Earth will be optional, and copies of the book are available for purchase at the Hope Church welcome desk. The four classes will address the following questions:

Oct. 9: What is the plot of the biblical story?
Oct. 16: What is salvation in the Old Testament?

Oct. 23: What is the New Testament's vision of redemption?

Oct. 30: What does this holistic eschatology mean for how we live today?



Pausing Mid-Way for Celebrations

On September 18, we collectively appreciated the work completed thus far on our Living Hope facility renovation project. The parking lot is finished, with its final coat of asphalt and striping. The canopy, which both indicates the primary entrance and offers shelter from rain, sleet, and snow, is also complete.

Indoors, a walking tour encouraged folks to explore the fresher, brighter Commons, as well as the renovated youth room, new nursery, and the single-use, gender neutral restroom. Members of the Living Hope Design and Capital Campaign Teams were on hand to answer questions like this one:

Where will the stained glass that was in the former prayer chapel/ Washington School Neighbors office be located? Honestly, we're not quite

sure. Because that piece of glass was freestanding and mounted on the wall, rather than installed in

it, we were able to remove it safely and store it for its protection. As the construction nears its conclusion, we'll consider the best location for its longterm display.

In a brief meeting before the open house, Ron Mulder gave an update on the funding for the construction project. He reviewed the progress toward our goal, expressing gratitude for the generosity and commitment of the Hope Church community. At the time of his update we have approximately \$500,000 yet to raise. He also noted that financing is in place through the RCA Growth Fund if we don't entirely reach our goal of \$3,257,000 by the end of the construction phase, and that the Stewardship and Finance Ministry involved in anticipating the

implications for operating budgets if we do need to assume a mortgage.

Your continued prayerful support is appreciated, for the financial resources, for the safety of those involved in the construction, and for continued patience with the changes and disruptions.

Please be aware that construction on the Gathering Area began on September 26 and will go through November 30, during the week (Monday-Friday, 7am - 5 pm). Therefore, you will need to enter the building through the 10th street doors for all daytime meetings or events. During the evening or on the weekend, you will be able to use the parking lot doors. Fellowship after worship will take place in the Commons on Sundays. All sign up sheets will also be available in the Commons on Sundays, and in the office during the week. Please also be aware that there will be considerable dust in the air as part of the demolition. Thanks for your understanding and flexibility!

Blueberry Pie Sales Aid Haitian Child

Early this summer one of the women in the commerce program of the Haiti Foundation Against Poverty brought her then 3-year-old son, Jorvens, to their school while a visiting mission team was offering medical care. In the previous few months a tumor had grown just under Jorvens' left eye. It was quickly determined that treatment in Haiti would not be possible, and in miraculous timing for Haiti a medical visa was obtained so that Jorvens could travel to the U.S. for diagnosis and treatment. He was diagnosed with rhabdomyosacroma

in Indianapolis and then transferred to DeVos Children's Hospital in Grand Rapids for treatment, where he observed his fourth birthday during his first week there. During the initial treatments he also lost the vision in his right eye. He has responded well to the treatments though also suffering from many of the side affects of chemotherapy. He is being cared for by Frentz and Mallery Neptune of HFAP and a foster family in GR.

In August the deacons of Hope Church voted to donate \$1,000 of the

proceeds from the recent blueberry pie sale to HFAP to help pay for Jorvens' care, with the balance raised going into the Adult Mission Trip Fund. Thank you to all who helped make the pies and all who purchased them so that we could provide some assistance for this critical need. In Mallery's own words of thanks, "Wow! That's wonderful! I am going through some of his medical bills today and this will really help! Thank you! Glad to hear it was another success this year!"

Just as you welcome us here, make us welcoming of others.



Your Body: Fantabulous "....awesomely and wonderfully made..."

A Faithful Fist!

That identifies the Heart that has beat in all of us since well before birth and faithfully functions until our last breath. It is a boneless fist of pulsating muscle.

We can feel its rhythm at times, mostly during exertion, but rarely think of it. It takes no signal from the brain. Mysteriously, it has its own electrical system and generates its own contracting sequences!

But heart disease is and has been the leading cause of death! Ironic, isn't it? This faithful fist which empowers everyday life and vitality becomes hampered and clogged by our disregard, denial and degrading lifestyles! It could comedically say, "I don't get no respect!"

More education needed? Nah, we are overloaded with heart knowledge, we understand what it needs and what is destructive.

Can our faith in medical care, treatments and drugs change all the damage? As thankful as we are for all of these to save us from ourselves, what is the heart of the matter?

How about a restored reverence for the Creator's work doled out to us in our personal bodies? Or about a renewed realization of the heart's majesty? How about loving life at its core of sustenance? Or about a revisit to our "good enough care" attitudes? Or about sustaining and restoring healthfulness in our personal world?

Does it take our body's warnings to awaken us to its working and wholeness needs? I remember well lying and foggily staring up at a monitor as a catheter slithered through my arteries to unclog and open! Confession, awakenedness, and new commitment came rather late, but not too late!

We also had a beautiful time of celebration on September 18th with an open house for the areas of our renovation project that are completed and put back into use for the sake of our ministry: the renovated Commons and Youth Room, the new nursey, the new canopy, and finished parking lot. These spaces were completed during the summer with relatively little impact on our congregational life beyond the day to day work of the staff. These spaces are either brand new or a refurbishment of spaces that we are continuing to use as we have before. The changes in these spaces are deeply appreciated and welcomed as the work done makes them more functional, more flexible, more hospitable. Have you noted how excellent the Commons sound system is? Or how bright the new lighting is? The youth ministry had an excellent time of celebrating and utilizing their new space and others are beginning to use that space as well. It's been a time of great celebration.

This next phase of work will be a fair bit more intrusive. If you haven't already, you will soon discover the inconvenience of arriving mid-week and having to walk around the building to the 10th street entrance. You will see the dust as you enter into the Gathering Area on Sunday. Some have already experienced the frustration of not knowing where certain things have been moved that used to be housed there. But those inconveniences will not last forever and I have greatly appreciated the work of our staff in anticipating and planning for alternatives, the tireless work of Lois Maassen and the Living Hope Design Team who meet so frequently to problem solve and creatively address the myriad of questions that come with a project like this.

But there is something more I wanted to name about the work of this project that some of you are fully aware of and feel deeply and some of you may not be aware of at all. We have begun and are continuing to tear down some spaces in our facility that many people over many years have painstakingly planned, designed, furnished, maintained, and lovingly tended. Think about the excitement and great care that led to the creation of the Garden Lounge, to the curating of our Library collection, or the design and loving care of our beautiful gardens. Think about the hours people have spent over the years investing in those spaces, tending them, improving them. We knew when we made and voted on these renovation plans that those spaces were going to change. We knew there was no way to bring in cranes and cement trucks without trampling the gardens. We knew that the expanded gathering area, the new chapel, the relocation of the reception area of the offices, the connection between gathering area and youth and nursery wing would inevitably require the dismantling of the Garden Lounge and the Library. We knew these things but now that the time is here I am mindful of the possible grief some are feeling as pieces of their contributions to our ministry are being dismantled. So I want to say a clear and strong "Thank You" for the vision you had to create those spaces and the dedication you brought to maintaining them. These spaces have served our ministry so very well for many, many years. To say that we are ready to have something new come into those spaces does not diminish in any way how important they have been to us before. I have no doubts that in the next 150 years of Hope Church's ministry that people will innovate and renovate and maybe even dismantle some of what we have all envisioned for today. It felt important to not just celebrate the new and the exciting but to name some of the loss that comes with closing a chapter. The wisdom of Ecclesiastes reminds us that "For everything there is a time and season..." He was right. But that doesn't mean its always easy when those shifting seasons come along.
