Christmas Offering

The Advent flyer for this season tells of Hope Church partnering with Rode Molla and her husband Endrias Assen in support of their ongoing ministry. Rode has been studying in the U.S. by God's guidance and providence, and she is very thankful for the opportunities that have opened for her. It is a blessing to see God's guiding hand as she travels to different areas and schools to pursue her degrees. Rode served in the Ethiopian Evangelical Church Mekane Yesus as National Children's Ministry Coordinator and she believes that she has a call to minister to children in Ethiopia.

Rode came to Holland, MI in August 2014 to pursue her Master of Theology degree at Western Theological Seminary. Through God's guiding hand I met Rode's prior pastor from her church in MN while I was attending a Spiritual Direction Intensive Weekend in Hendersonville, SC. He informed me about Rode's situation and her need for a contact in Holland to help her become familiar with the community. I invited Rode and her husband Endrias to worship with us at Hope Church. They participated in worship with us until they left for Saint Paul, MN. Later Rode gave a presentation for the Health and Reconciliation ministries and the congregation regarding her ministry and vision to minister to at-risk children in Ethiopia.

Just as Rode and Endrias were becoming comfortable and settled in Holland, it was time to move on. Rode had begun her CPE studies in St. Paul and was headed back there to complete the clinical work. John and I drove them to the Union Station in Chicago and sent them off on the train for their new home. It was not an easy time for them, and they were very thankful for their contact with people from Hope Church and the love and support they continued to receive.

Rode began applying to different Theological schools to pursue her Ph.D. She got admitted at Iliff School of Theology and Denver University Joint Ph.D. program. Upon completion of her CPE work, they were on the move again. God's guiding hand was evident. They had no furniture and knew no one in Denver. They were quite apprehensive. Through a relative of mine, they were put in contact with Volunteers in Action. Volunteers met them at the airport, found furniture for their apartment and even helped them purchase an inexpensive car.

There has been much violence taking place in Ethiopia over the past year. The government has at times shut down the internet, and this has disrupted Rode's ability to keep in touch with her family back in Ethiopia. For this reason, she covets, even more, her ongoing relationship with Hope Church. Soon, we will be receiving a letter from them telling of their journey. QiaoQiao Chen





The Janes Family





Kids Hope

Thanks to our partners at Third Reformed Church, we will be participating in a new Kids Hope event this December which we will hope will be helpful in building a trusting, working relationship between our mentors and their Kids Hope students.

At the end-of-the-year evaluation conducted by Third Church Kids Hope volunteers last year, some Third Church mentors told director Beverley Rannow that it was the activities connected with our annual End-of-the-Year Celebration that helped them to finally begin to create a real relationship with their child. That made them wish that something similar might take place much earlier in the program year so that they could build on the good feelings it created as the year progressed.

In response to that request, Beverley

and Vicki Rumpsa have worked hard to develop an afternoon of activities called Fall Fun Day. It will take place at Third Church on December 6 from 3 to 5 p.m. and our hope is that most of the Kids Hope students and mentors from both churches will be able to participate. Also attending will be volunteers from among the ranks of

our substitute mentors and prayer partners who will help supervise the activities and prepare and serve the afterschool snack.

Age appropriate activities, chosen because they require mentor and students to work together, will take up the bulk of the time, but we will also be showing last summer's Camp Geneva video during the snack time. As you may know, both Hope and Third Churches in conjunction with Camp Geneva offer an opportunity to spend a week at camp to each Kids Hope student. Our hope is that showing the video may lead to more children and their families taking advantage of that opportunity next summer.

To give you some idea of what will be happening, here's a sampling of the activities that are planned: designing and constructing out of poster board a maze through which students will try to blow a ping pong ball, decorating a frame for each student's student/ mentor photo, racing cars down ramps built by the student and his/her mentor, playing GaGa Ball, and (on a tamer note) making Christmas cards. Vicki and Beverley tried to choose a variety of activities, some of which are intended to appeal to the students' competitive spirits while others place their emphasis on giving to others.

Since parents are being asked to pick up their child at the end of Fall Fun Day, we are also hoping that this will be an opportunity for mentors and parents to interact briefly with each other. Just being able to put a face to a name can make a difference for some parents who aren't totally sold on having their child be a part of Kids Hope.

Please pray with us as we embark on this new adventure. Specific needs are cooperative weather (volunteers will be walking the children from Vanderbilt to Third Church), good attendance, safety for all concerned, and most of all that through this event and though all of the Kids Hope programs of the year we will demonstrate the love of Jesus to each of our students and through them to each of their families.

Trip to Haiti

To our Hope Church members and friends,

Much of the work of Non-Governmental Organizations around the world is to do "relief" work where it's needed. Last week the work we saw that needs to be done in Haiti looked more like needing "re-creation". Some of the wreckage and ruin in southern Haiti was the result of Hurricane Matthew but much of it was much older systemic neglect. Either way, it was a sobering look at the plight of the Haitian people.

Thanks to your generosity we left for Port au Prince on Thursday evening, October 27 with over 30 tarps, 50 jars of peanut butter, a dozen solar lights and an expense account of \$1,000. After a night in Detroit we arrived in PaP Friday afternoon.

We spent Saturday and Sunday at the Haiti Foundation Against Poverty compound repacking large inventories of pills into small zip lock bags, purchasing the building supplies and needed tools, and attending worship.

Monday morning four of us boarded a small six-passenger airplane for an hour flight to Jeremie, a small coastal town in the extreme southwestern part of Haiti. While Port au Prince was mostly missed by Matthew, Jeremie took a direct hit. While the mountains and coastline looked serene from 5,000 feet, the view from the ground was like a war zone. Blown off roofs, twisted and destroyed palm trees, a lot of blue tarps and deep mud. And lots of suffering people.

We were hosted by missionaries Aaron and Andrea Taylor, and their four children. On Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday we drove each morning an hour east of Jeremie to a very small rural mountain community of Rouseuex. There we distributed the tarps, lights and peanut butter (which were lusted after!) and, to each of 36 families, four 2x4 timbers for roof joists, four 1x4 boards for purlins, and fourteen 3' x 6' sheets of corrugated galvanized tin for roofing.

We were able to rebuild three of the homes' roofs in our remaining time there. We believe that the remaining families could see how we used the materials and copy what was done.

Most of these families were living in houses with no roofs or whatever small scraps of tin roofing they could find, some torn rags and tarps for side walls, dirt floors, and nowhere to retreat to completely avoid the rain or the sun. They lived totally outside---old grandparents, young parents, little kids, and recently born babies. ALL outside and ALL exposed to whatever weather came their way. It was not easy to observe. We felt blessed to be there and give what little relief we could, but so much more needs to be done.

We left Haiti with a sober reminder that we live in a blessed place and worship with a generous and loving church congregation. Thank you so very much for supporting us. Please continue to pray for the Haitian people.

Your Body: Fantabulous "....awesomely and wonderfully made..."

It's Really an Organ?!

A moody teenage boy wrestling with skin concerns said, "I hate my skin!" Father, "Then take it off." Son, "That's stupid, everything would fall out!" Father, "So live with it." So we do, from our silky soft first day to our wrinkled, rumpled last.

Skin, our biggest organ, performs incredible functions. Scientists: "Skin is highly intelligent." Stretched out the average human skin would cover about 25 square feet. (Don't be too visual!) If it stood by itself it would weigh 9 lbs.

Skin: It's tough! elastic! waterproof! It's active: "good" bacteria colonies lie on its surface as part of our immune system. It prevents our water-saturated bodies from drying up.

More: It sweats out toxins and waste. A pair of feet have 260,000 sweat glands (it pores out!), 8 oz.per day. (Yeah, those gym socks!)

Skin is ever new. 600,000 particles die and drop away every hour (ever hear them hit the floor?). Cells are replaced hourly, being pushed up constantly from beneath to surface firmness, a 40 days comeuppance.

Skin is the thinnest in the eyelids- and oh so gentle. It's the thickest on the soles of the feet- for walking barefoot of course.

Skin has 3 layers. The outer layer is a protective barrier providing skin tone and color. The inner layer is tough connective tissue. The center layer is substantial "spoil" out of which....

Our skin is much more than what we squint at in the mirror, see beyond our sleeves, or must note when we undress for sleep.

The Creator God has wrapped us in Wonder!

How can we protect what is protecting us? Cooperate with the healthfulness it is designed to provide?

Youth Ministry

Imagine intently studying each of the presidential candidates and their platforms, yet never being allowed to cast a vote. What if you cared so deeply for a candidate that you volunteered for their campaign, all the while accepting that it is illegal for you to enter the voting booth? What might it feel like to have no voice in the decision for your future, yet still have to wade through a confusing world where your brown friends are threatened, your gay friends spat at, and your own safety feels less sure? While most of us adults are struggling to make sense of our post-election world, our youths are trying to grapple with a country they feel passionately invested in, yet have no democratic voice to be heard. This is the reality of many youths across the country and the youth of Hope Church are no different.

Over the past several months, I have been impressed by our youth's knowledge, not only of our government systems, foreign policies, and the state of democracy, but by their acute understanding of each of the candidates. They care. Deeply. Many teens are so well-informed about our democratic process that it puts many of us apathetic adults to shame. On a recent Sunday, I asked our High Hopers if they were sick of discussing politics yet, since it had already been about 3 weeks since the election. Their social media feeds are just as vitriolic as many adults are and I figured they were as sick of it as I was. Instead, they relished the opportunity to discuss their fears and process the fallout that is happening at their schools as well as ways they think our government can improve. In some cases, there has been an increase of bullying against minority and LGBTQ students. Their schools are responding by bringing in outside organizations to coach on how to handle the stress and aggression.

Perhaps you have heard it said that teens who have recently completed drivers training are some of the least accident prone in our population. I wonder if some of the same could be said of our youths studying civics, history, and government in school. If we let some of the problems of our country be examined by those of us who are younger, I wonder what fresh ideas they might have? "And a little child might lead them" indeed.

When I think of why Christmas Caroling in Advent is so important to me personally and to our life together as a congregation, one thing comes to mind. This is a tangible sign that we remember and we cherish our members who can no longer worship with us on Sunday in the sanctuary. When a group of singers walk through the door loaded down with poinsettias, cookies, and a bag chocked full of cards, our members feel cherished and loved by us and we feel cherished and loved by them. I'll touch on 2 things to motivate your participation in caroling: obligation and blessing. The New Fast Food: A Program of Eighth Day Farm

Objective

To feed the hungry in our area with food that is healthy, delicious, and grown in ways that steward creation.



Overview

The New Fast Food is an innovative approach to feeding the hungry in our community. Instead of donating a random variety of vegetables and assuming recipients know how to utilize them, we are attempting to tackle key obstacles people face when receiving produce. For a variety of complex reasons, preparing food has become difficult and intimidating for many people and, as a result, unhealthy processed foods that are ready made and convenient are the staples of most diets. There are enormous health care

and quality of life costs associated with these dietary choices that affect both individuals and society. The New Fast Food addresses not only the problem of hunger, but of health; as increased health correlates to better employment and stronger families.

The New Fast Food makes eating healthy more attractive and convenient. Attractive because the meals taste great! Convenient because all the ingredients necessary to make the meal are included in the brown bag along with a recipe card, QR Code and link to an instructional video that explains how to prepare the meal step by step.

These bags will be distributed through partnerships with local organizations that have a history of serving those in our community. Eighth Day Farm is collaborating with Community Action House, Center for Women in Transition, Good Samaritan Ministries, Breakfast with Baby, St. Vincent's pantry, and the Mobile Food Pantry. We plan to distribute over 2,500 meals in 2016. All the produce will be grown at the Growth Center site at 709 Pine Avenue.
