Christmas Offering to support Doctors Without Borders in Yemen

Médecins Sans Frontières, MSF or Doctors Without Borders, was founded to bring medical professionals together to not only provide aid in war zones, but to talk about what they saw. In spite of the risks, this group refused to watch in silence. They believed that silence could kill, making those that watched complicit in the atrocities. They hoped that by bringing abuses to light, they could help bring them to an end.

In recent months MSF has been living out this mission in Yemen in the face of increased bombings and heavy ground fighting. They have recently made the very difficult decision to close down some of their clinics to insure the safety of their staff but the need to provide quality medical care is only increasing, creating yet another major humanitarian crisis. The Board of Deacons has decided to designate the 2018 Christmas Offering to Doctors Without Borders for the ongoing work in and around Yemen. Gifts may be made at any time using the Christmas offering envelope or by noting "Christmas Offering" or "Doctors Without Borders" on the memo line of your check.

The beauty of pine scattered islands sprinkled with brown to pink granite cliffs was enhanced by seeing our girls adapt to tight living quarters on a small boat.

As our daughters grew to adulthood and married, we had the pleasure of encouraging our grandchildren to enjoy nature. Through sailing, kayaking, swimming, and hiking, their enjoyment, understanding, and respect for nature grew.

Washington School Neighbors: Spread Simple Kindness

I have been blessed with a job that allows me to connect with my neighbors, and those in this community. I have seen those who struggle, those who flourish and others that just exist. One of the pieces of my job is to support a group of neighbors who desire to play a more invested role in their community, called Block Connectors. We meet once a month and talk about upcoming WSN hosted events within our neighborhood and community, resources available and also discuss concerns that they feel need to be addressed. Block Connectors support a smaller group of neighbors and act within the three main roles of: connecting, communicating and gathering with those who live in a designated block. Every month I look forward to gathering with these neighbors and often try to challenge them in ways that will help then better connect with residents on their block.

We live in a time where we cannot escape the feeling that we have a disconnected society. It is easy to feel overwhelmed, discouraged and uncertain about the future that we are building for those that will come after us. I started thinking about ways to spread a little kindness in the Washington School Neighborhood. Sometimes taking a smaller piece of a community and addressing a specific issue seems less daunting than looking at the big picture and feeling helpless to change any of it.

I went out and bought several packs of blank note cards. I challenged my Block Connectors to each deliver five notes of appreciation, encouragement or well wishes to neighbors on their block. I took out barriers that may make this challenge harder for some, by saying that they do not have to sign the notes, but could. They did not even have to know the name of the neighbor that they deliver the note to. I simply wanted them to think about the residents on their block, maybe someone who does not have a support system, and extend a note saying "I see you, you are heard and appreciated". Sometimes an unexpected gesture of kindness is all we need to keep going and fighting for a better future.

I would like to extend the same offer to all of you. If you would be willing to deliver five notes to your neighbors, with messages that can encourage and uplift, I will provide the note cards. My Block Connectors all chose to participate in this challenge, so over the months of November and December there will be over 35 notes of kindness given out in the WSN neighborhood. Every little piece of kindness that can be shared has the ability to spread.

ministry/committee HIGHLIGHT

This series of highlights on ministries/committees at Hope Church is intended to be sure our members are aware of how things happen and their opportunities to engage.

Facility Strategy Committee

Dan Fisher, Facility Strategy Committee Chair

A new initiative at Hope Church, the Facility Strategy Committee has as its primary purpose to be intentional about planning for and managing our facility as an asset to our ministry. This charge grew out of what we learned from the Living Hope facility renovation, which necessarily included a number of upgrades, especially to HVAC (heat, ventilation, and air conditioning). While the volunteers of Building & Grounds have done (and continue to do) an admirable job of responding to day-to-day issues and needs, we realized a more strategic view would help us focus future capital projects on new functionality.

While we may never completely eliminate surprises (like the leaking of the north wall of the educational wing or the restoration urgently needed

to the sanctuary and bell tower) and the costs associated, we're working toward minimizing large expenses.

To start, the Facilities Strategy Team is developing a deep understanding of the condition of our many facilities systems through what we call a health assessment. Based on that, we will make plans to keep our systems in good working condition, prolong the life of the systems or equipment, and project when major expenditures will be required. Among the components of our health assessment are roofs, HVAC systems, exteriors walls, interiors, plumbing and electrical, and fire protection; we've also identified sustainability, functionality, historic preservation, and age and disability concerns as perspectives to include.

Our team members include Paul Elzinga, Clare Heyboer, Lois Maassen, Sam Martin, Ben Sikkink, and Dan Fisher. We are also asking other Hope Church members to provide support on one of many of the system health assessments we have targeted for evaluation and planning.

Our church building is one of the oldest churches in Holland, with additions made over the decades as our needs have evolved. Some components are 150 years old; each part of the building uses materials and methods of the decade of construction. Our challenge is complicated, but taking care of our beloved church, keeping it relevant to our current work, congregation, and community, is well worth the effort.

- Take a moment to read the poem in the far-right column. It's a poem I wrote in 2007 titled "Mundane."
- Now, read the poem again. I've developed a habit of always reading poems twice.
- So, what do you think? or better yet, what do you feel, or notice, or wonder?

OK, that's the poetry exercise; we'll come back to it later.

Over the past several months this column has had an ongoing topic of the pastors delving into the interplay in our faith between action and formation, between living out our faith and nurturing our faith. Identifying and addressing that interplay – which sometimes feels more like a conflict, and sometimes feels more like just one or the other – has struck a chord with many at Hope Church and has been a point of discussion in many settings in our church life.

One of the ways that I have come to see some things about myself in this interplay and tension that exists with action and nurture is that I'm a person who can tend to focus more on thinking and analysis than on reflecting and feeling. Is that something any of you can relate to?! I tend to gravitate toward analyzing faith, or analyzing an issue, and when I've done that analysis then I have a sense of being settled about what I believe and what I will do.

And that all works out pretty well for me, until I run into some matters of life and faith that don't lend themselves so neatly to my analysis and definitive action.

I wasn't particularly aware of that in myself for a long time, but at a point in my life poetry found me and gently demanded that I pay attention to things like mystery and feeling, images and ambiguity, lament and hope.

Poetry offered me something I didn't know I was missing, and now it is a lifeline for me of exploring the places in me that need to be heard, healed, confronted, felt, nurtured. When I write poetry, I am surprised by what emerges – not because it is good, but because it says things that I wasn't aware were in me. When I read poetry, I am often amazed – amazed by the creativity of humanity and by the way a poem seems to describe and recognize me.

So with all that said, what about the poem I've offered here? I gave you a chance to read it and to feel and wonder about it. Whatever surfaced in you is good and I'd love to hear about it. Now it's my turn.

I shared this poem because it is an Advent/Christmas poem. I didn't know that when I wrote it 10 years ago, but it is. It is an Advent poem because it gives voice to a deep ache about all of the brokenness in life and a deep longing for wholeness. It is a poem set to the tune of "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel." It is a Christmas poem because it dares to hope, dares to believe. The birth of Christ is not quaint or naïve or wishful thinking; rather, the Incarnation opens me to audacious things like hope and beauty and joy. It is a poem set to the tune of "Joy to the World."

How can it be both? Well, that's just what we've been delving into these past months, isn't it? I invite you in this season to lean into space for longing and yearning; I invite you to lean into joy and hope; I invite you to read a poem and to write one.

And as you, I, we, do so, then also listen for where the Spirit is leading

and calling into the seasons ahead. It may be a calling to make some good things in the world seem mundane.
